**New Locomotives.**  
A fine large new engine, intended for the fast mail service on the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta R. R., arrived here to-day over the Atlantic Coast Line. It was built by the Rogers Locomotive Works, at Paterson, N. J., and has a 16-inch cylinder, a 24-inch stroke, a 5 feet driving wheel, and is fitted with air brakes and all of the latest improvements. It is to be followed in a day or two by another of the same class and for the same service.

**A New Canal.**  
A friend at Brothers' Hole, in Pender county, writes to us regarding the execution of a new enterprise by Mr. R. L. Bordeaux, namely, the cutting of a canal on the Northeast river, about 35 miles above this city. It is across a neck of land known as the Horse Shoe, is about one mile long and 30 feet wide, and saves the boatmen about ten miles of travel. It is washing out very fast, and large flats can go through it now. So swiftly, in fact, is the depth growing that it is expected that the steamer *Clinton* will soon be able to make her way through it. Mr. Bordeaux did all of the work at his own expense and it has cost him a great deal in both time and money. The canal is worth thousands of dollars to the people of Pender and the adjoining counties, and it is certain that they all owe Mr. Bordeaux a debt of gratitude. Daniel Shaw, Esq., Dr. W. T. Ennett and Mr. Jesse Bowden, our correspondent adds, have examined the work and pronounce it one of the finest canals in the State.
