We understand that the work of erecting poles for the American Union Telegraph Company along the line of the Carolina Central Railroad is progressing rapidly. The poles are in position as far as Wadesboro, and those who are of 35,771; crude turpentine, 2,291 domesstretching the wires are close behind tic. them. Wadesboro is 136 miles from Wilmington and 52 from Charlotte. If the work is kept up at the present rate we may expect the wires in this city long before the first of February.

We mention these facts, even as obscurely as we do, at the risk of giving offence—the names we dare not call—in the hope that some others may be stimulated thereby into doing good of themselves for the poor and needy among us.
