The American Union Wires.

We understand that the work of erect-
 ing poles for the American Union Tele-
 graph Company along the line of the
 Carolina Central Railroad is progress-
 ing rapidly. The poles are in position
 as far as Wadesboro, and those who are
 stretching the wires are close behind
 them. Wadesboro is 136 miles from
 Wilmington and 52 from Charlotte. If
 the work is kept up at the present rate
 we may expect the wires in this city long
 before the first of February.

Provided For.

Mr. J. F. Bloom, one of the unfortu-
 nate victims of the recent disaster on the
 Western Division of the Carolina Cen-
 tral Railroad, who was formerly a resi-
 dent of this city, and was brother to Mr.

 all \$8,000 on his life. He was a member

 which gives his family \$2,000 and had a
 paid-up policy for \$4,000 in the Cotton
 States Life Insurance Company of Ma-
 con, Ga. The widow and the orphans
 are thus provided for.

The Universal Sentiment.

The Xmas trade has been better this
 year than it has been for the past ten
 years. Confectioners, grocers and toy
 dealers have little or nothing of their
 stocks left and as a consequence are

 exceedingly lucky and sold largely of
 their wares. Money seemed to be more

 was "the happiest Xmas of my life."

City Court.

The only item of interest before the
 Mayor this morning was that of Benj.
 Robinson, colored, charged with the
 larceny of certain articles from Messrs.
 Brown & Roddick's toy store on Christ-
 mas Eve night. Defendant was found
 guilty and bound over to the next term
 of the Criminal Court in the sum of \$50
 in default of which he was committed in-
 to the custody of the Sheriff.

 Xmas cheer, things good to eat and
 good to wear, and under the cover of
 night distributed them to those whom
 they had previously ascertained were
 most in need, and one of the ladies of the
 same family, we have been told, is now
 busy in preparing a Christmas treat, all
 at her own expense, for hundreds of chil-
 dren. We mention these facts, even as
 obscurely as we do, at the risk of giving
 offence—the names we dare not call—in
 the hope that some others may be stim-
 ulated thereby into doing good of them-
 selves for the poor and needy among us.

 438 domestic and 3,333 foreign, a total
 of 35,771; crude turpentine, 2,291 domes-
 tic.
