**A New Car Burned.**  
A new express and baggage car at the Carolina Central depot in Charlotte was burned yesterday morning, about 3 o'clock. The alarm was given when the fire was discovered but another alarm was given out in the city and the engines turned back when within two blocks of the depot. The car was entirely burned, all except the platform and air brakes. The origin of the fire is unknown as it is said that the fire in the stove in the car had been carefully put out. It is thought by some to have been incendiary. The car was empty at the time.

## More Fast Time.

The Hessenger ran of 3 hours and 45 minutes between Wilmington and Weldon, exclusive of stoppages, or 3:55 in all, was beaten a few days ago by engineer McSween. He made the run between the termini of the Wilmington and Weldon R. R. in 3 hours and 45 minutes, including four stoppages, making the actual running time 3 hours and 35 minutes. Mr. Hessenger no doubt could have done the same, as he ran the last fifty miles of the road on schedule time. The engines used in making these runs were made in the shops in this city.

## A New Year's Invitation

Hon. A. H. VanBokkelen, President of the Chamber of Commerce, has extended an invitation to the members of the Chamber and Produce Exchange and the subscribers thereto, to call at his residence on the 1st day of January, at 1 o'clock, sharp. The gentlemen present at the Rooms of the Exchange on New Year's Day, at 12:30, will start at that hour to make the above call. It is presumed there will be a full business meeting on this occasion of the annual reunion of the members of our two most important commercial bodies.

## Eclipses.

On December 31st the sun will be partially eclipsed, but the affair will only be satisfactorily visible in Maine, the effect lessening westward. Only three-quarters of the sun will be obscured from the most favorable standpoint, the North Atlantic and Western Europe. This is the second eclipse of the sun, visible in this country, this year, the last occurring January 11th, when it was total in California. The partial eclipse this month will occur between 7 and 8 o'clock in the morning. The next total eclipse of the sun in the United States will occur May 28th, 1900, when the shadow of the moon will pass from New Orleans to the ocean at Norfolk. A large number of people now living will not have an opportunity of observing that spectacle. Anybody who wants to see a total eclipse of the sun in the near future will have to go to the Isthmus of Suez in May, 1882.

## Dr. Schaff's Lecture.

An audience, not very large, but certainly very appreciative, was present in the First Presbyterian Church last evening to hear the address announced by Rev. Philip Schaff, D. D., on the revision of the Bible and a history of the various translations which have been made. The reverend gentleman was listened to with marked interest throughout his entire discourse. He is himself an author of distinguished ability and is well qualified to speak of the subject matter of his address. The revision of the New Testament, which has just been completed by a body of divines of knowledge and ability, chosen from various branches of the Church, will be published early in February, by the University Presses of England, at Oxford and Cambridge. Dr. Schaff is Chairman of the American branch of the Bible Revision Committee. In this connection, we publish the following, which has been handed to us for insertion:

The American Bible Revision Committee have completed the revision of the English version of the New Testament and transmitted the result of their labors to England. The University Presses of Oxford and Cambridge are expected to issue the revised New Testament in February, 1881. The Old Testament will be published two or three years later.

The American Revisers have given their time and labor for eight years without compensation. The necessary expenses have been provided for by voluntary subscriptions. Every friend of the great undertaking who will contribute towards the expenses ten dollars, or more, before the first of March next, will receive a memorial copy of the first University Edition of the Revised New Testament, handsomely bound and inscribed. The money must be sent to Mr. Andrew L. Taylor, Treasurer, in the Bible House, New York.
