City Court.

John Baker, alias Edmund Edmund-
son, and Wm. Young, two white sea-
faring men, were arraigned together with
John Lewis, colored, before the Mayor
this morning upon the charge of an af-
ray. Lewis, the colored man, claimed

had in his hands and was carrying along
the street with dinner in it, and that he
struck one of the men and kicked the
other. Per contra the two seafaring
men stoutly denied Lewis' assertion, and
testified so as to make Lewis the ag-
gressor. The testimony, however, was
a little mixed and the Mayor discharged
Baker and fined William Young \$5
and John Lewis \$2. This finished the
business and the Court adjourned.

Three cargoes of cotton, amounting to

shingles, comprising 237,636 feet lumber
and 100,300 shingles, were cleared here
to-day for foreign ports. Messrs. Wil-
liams & Murchison ship the cotton and
Messrs. Northrop & Cumming the lum-
ber and shingles. This last cargo goes
to the West Indies and 1,307 bales of the
cotton is for Bremen, while the balance
all goes to Liverpool.
