**Painful Accident.**

Mr. Craig is partially paralyzed in his right side and imprudently venturing on the street he slipped and fell, sustaining a very severe sprain of the right hip. The fall was very violent and at first it was feared that the bone was broken. The sufferer is now under careful surgical treatment and we trust that the injury may prove but a temporary one.

**Census Returns.**  
 The official returns of the census reports for New Hanover and the adjoining counties are at hand. New Hanover, has 21,387 inhabitants, of whom 9,651 are males and 11,436 females; 20,934 are natives, and 553 foreign born; 6,163 white and 13,224 colored.

Fender has 12,468; 6,311 males and 6,157 females; 5,511 white and 6,956 colored; 23 foreign born. Bladen has 7,663 white and 8,505 colored; Brunswick 5,338 white and 4,053 colored; Columbus, 8,926 white and 5,513 colored; Duplin 10,586 white and 8,185 colored; Onslow 6,610 white and 3,218 colored; Robeson 11,908 white and 11,974 colored; Sampson 13,347 white and 9,545 colored.

By consent of counsel on both sides, however, a hearing of the case has been postponed until January 13th, on account of the absence of an important witness.

**On the Lake.**  
 We learn from Mr. H. E. Clark that on Wednesday last the thermometer at Lake Waccamaw, 34 miles from this city on the W. C. & A. R. R., was 9° at half-past 7 o'clock in the morning, and that the Lake was nearly frozen across, and would in all probability have been frozen from shore to shore but for the high winds prevailing at the time which broke up the ice. **German Carp.**  
 Mr. J. Leeb, of this city, has received and placed in his propagating fish pond, in the rear of his residence on Front street, a number of young carp. They are coming on nicely, and will soon be large enough to follow the streamlet from Mr. Leeb's pond to the turbid waters of the Cape Fear. A curious fact about carp is that they do not commence to spawn until they are four years old, and during the first four years their growth is the most rapid, after which it gradually diminishes annually until they are twenty years old, when they do not perceptibly increase in size, unless freed by artificial means. There are only eighty of the original number brought from Germany living, and about half of this number are in the Droid Hill ponds at Baltimore.

The carp in Mr. Leeb's pond will be used for breeding purposes. They attain a very old age. Dr. Haesel, the importer of these fish, states that he saw at Luxemburg, Austria, one carp three hundred years old; so old (even that moss grew on its back)—yet it was active and appeared to have as much vitality as the youngest fish. Thirty pounds is the usual maximum weight of the carp, yet by proper care they will grow heavier.

## Freezing Weather on the River.

The steamer D. Murchison, Captain Roberts, of the Express Steamboat Line, arrived here early this morning with the ice hanging in a perfect sheet as thick as a trailing vine on a piazza in the summer time, from the stern of the boat. The wheel in making its revolutions always throws more or less water against the stern, the boat, be it understood, being a stern-wheel steamer and the water from its funnels it reached the boat. Captain Roberts informed us this morning that when he made his last trip from here on Wednesday last at every landing where he stopped he had to send men out with axes to cut the cakes of ice from the paddles of the wheel. To-day we noticed lightwood fires built under the eccentric rods on either side of the wheel of the steamer to thaw them out, so that when attempting to work the engines at starting there would be no danger of a sudden snap.

**Knights of Pythias.**  
 A circular has been issued by George W. Lindsay, Supreme Chancellor of the order of Knights of Pythias, to the subordinate lodges, from which we take the following extract in regard to the endowment fund: "Since the date of its organization to the present time there have been instituted 467 sections, located in every State and Territory under the jurisdiction of the Supreme Lodge, and comprising a membership of 10,297 in the first class, which provides for an endowment of \$1,000 on the death of a member in good standing, and 14,804 in the second class, the endowment policy of which is \$2,000. The third class, which was created at the last session of the Supreme Lodge for the benefit of brethren over the limit of age in the first and second classes, is yet in its incipency, but will doubtless be availed of by many members whose age prevents them entering the other two classes. The limit of age in this class is sixty years."
