The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Pender county was held yesterday, present the Chairman, Daniel Shaw, Esq., and Commissioner James Alderman.

The report of J. F. Moore, Justice of the Peace in Caswell township, was submitted, approved and received.

Boney Southland, Standard Keeper, presented his bond for \$250, with Arnold Teachey as surety, which was approved.

A number of bills were ordered paid.
Capt. A. C. Ward, the newly appointed Sheriff, was allowed until the 10th inst. to complete his bond, several of his bondsmen failing to appear on account of the severe weather. The following gentlemen were present and accepted by the Board for the amounts set opposite their names as sureties for Capt. Ward, viz: J. E. Ward, of Duplin, \$3,000; E. Porter, of Pender, \$6,000; B. E. Newkirk, of Duplin, \$1,000; W. R. Ward, of Duplin, \$3,000; T. A. McLendon, of Pender, \$1,000; Arnold Teachey, of Pender, \$2,000; R. C. Johnson, of Pender, \$3,000; S. P. Hand, of Pender, \$1,000; G. A. Herring, of Pender, \$1,000; J. T. Bland, of Pender, \$1,000; W. T. Bannerman, of Pender, \$2,000.
Adjourned to meet again next Monday, 10th inst.

Father Abram J. Ryan.
Father Ryan, the poet priest of the South, and the known author of the celebrated "Conquered Banner," as well as the hardly less celebrated poem, "The Sword of Lee," is to visit this city this week by special invitation, and will give poetical readings on Friday evening, January 7th, at the Opera House, at 8 o'clock, the proceeds of which are to be devoted to charitable purposes.

We surmise there is hardly a man or woman living in this city, of any degree of intelligence, whose sympathies were with the struggling Confederates during the war, but has heard of the eloquent poet, whose name heads this article; and we can hardly imagine a man who ever wore the tattered gray, or a woman whose sympathies were with the boys in gray, who does not want to both see and hear the reverend clergyman who has put so truthfully in verse the sentiments of every Confederate heart. We predict for Father Ryan a crowded house and an appreciative audience. The reverend gentleman, we learn, will arrive here on Thursday, and will be the guest of Col. F. W. Kerchner.

Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met in regular monthly session yesterday afternoon. The committee on Fire Department and the committee on Streets and Wharves were granted further time to make their reports.
The Chief of Police reported the fire alarm in the railroad bell as fixed.
A communication from the New Hanover Board of Health (published by us yesterday) was read and referred to a committee consisting of the Mayor, Alderman Myers and Alderman Foster to confer with a committee from the Board of County Commissioners.
Alderman Myers offered the following resolution, which was adopted, viz:
WHEREAS, Police Officer Petteway was stricken with paralysis a few hours after being relieved from duty on the 10th of December, and died on the 23rd,
Resolved, That his pay for the full month be credited to his account, and the City Treasurer is hereby instructed to pay the amount to his widow.
Alderman Myers also offered the following, which was adopted:
Resolved, That in view of the extremely cold weather and the high price of fuel, the pay of the street force be increased from 75 cents to \$1.00 per day for the months of January and February.

A resolution was adopted instructing the City Treasurer to proceed in accordance with the acts of the Legislature and the general tax ordinance of the Board of Aldermen, to advertise the sale of real estate for delinquent taxes; the sale of the said real estate to begin on the 15th of February, 1881.
The Mayor presented a petition from tax payers, representing \$3,573,000 worth of real estate, which had been presented to the Board of Audit and Finance, asking their approval of the contract with the Wilmington Market Company.
A resolution was adopted that the Board should meet at the call of the Mayor to take final action in regard to the Market question.
The report of the Superintendent of Health for the month of December was read and ordered on file.
The report of the Chief of the Fire Department for the months of November and December was read and ordered to be filed.
At the regular meeting of the Board of Audit and Finance, held yesterday afternoon, the contract between the city and Wilmington Market Company was referred to the City Attorney, and the further consideration of the matter deferred until a subsequent meeting to be called by the Chairman of the Board.

County Commissioners.

The following is a report of the proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners and the Board of Education transacted after our close yesterday:
The Board then proceeded to draw a venire of jurors to serve during the February term of the Criminal Court, with the following result: Harvey Webb, Samuel Davis, J. W. St. George, Jno M. The following persons were granted licenses to retail spirituous liquors for three months: R. J. Scarborough, W. Fienken, Jno D. Doscher, Jas M. McGowan, W. M. Otercon, J. O. Nixon, A. B. Cook.

The Board then adjourned to Wednesday, the 12th instant, at 2 1/2 o'clock p. m.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The Board of County Commissioners then resolved themselves into a Board of Education, when the following proceedings were had:
The Board proceeded to make a distribution of the School Fund to the various Districts, as follows, the per capita being \$1.75:
No. 1—White children 980; amount \$1,715. Colored children 1,559; amount \$2,728.25.
No. 2—White children 916; amount \$1,603. Colored children 1,466; amount \$2,565.50.
No. 3—White children 74; amount \$129.50. Colored children 91; amount \$159.25.
No. 4—White children 121; amount \$211.75. Colored children 97; amount \$169.75.
No. 5—White children 230; amount \$402.50. Colored children 351; amount \$614.25.
No. 6—White children 89; amount \$63.25. Colored children 446; amount \$780.50.
Total white children, 2,360. Total colored children 4,010. Total amount for distribution \$11,147.50.
The Board of Education then adjourned.
