

Notes by Cable.

The President of the Orange Free State has refused to permit the rebel Basuto chief to obtain ammunition in his territory.

Dr. Schlieemann has presented his collection of Trojan antiquities to the Emperor of Germany to be placed in the Museum at Berlin.

The Russians in their recent engagement with the Tekke Turcomans are said to have lost three thousand men and a great quantity of rifles and ammunition. The Turcoman loss was slight.

Two envoys from Abyssinia have presented a letter to the Khedive of Egypt from the King, stating that he had ordered the opening of all roads affording communication between Egypt and Abyssinia.

The Rouski Vedemosti (newspaper), of St. Petersburg, says the Saratoff Assembly reports that seven hundred and fifty thousand peasants are starving in that province. It is stated that upwards of a million peasants are in absolute want in Samara.

A duel with swords has taken place between M. Graux and M. d'Infreville, nephew of Mme. de Bremond, in consequence of a letter of Mme. Graux to M. Laisant in connection with the charges against M. Emile de Girardin. M. Graux was wounded below the eye.

Aged 115 Years.

St. Louis, Jan. 4.—Harriet N. Cooper, a colored woman, died in Cheltenham, one of the suburbs of this city, on New Year's Day, aged 115 years. She weighed 400 pounds. She was the mother of twenty-five children, the youngest of whom is 62 years old. Her husband is 101 years old, and is still living.

The Indiana senatorship.

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 4.—The Legislature of Indiana will convene on Thursday next. Gen. Ben Harrison's friends claim that he will receive the party nomination on the first ballot. The other prominent candidates are the Hon. William Cumback and the Hon. Godlove S. Orth.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 4.—The Republican members of the Senate and Assembly met in joint caucus this evening, and on the first ballot nominated Gen. Jno. F. Miller for United States Senator, the vote standing: Miller, 62, and Senator Booth, 5.

Raleigh Visitor: Mr. Napoleon Williams, living six miles east of the city, fell into the fire on Saturday last, and was badly burned, as was also his mother who attempted his rescue.

Louisburg Times: Jos W. Fuller, of Harris Township, made this year, with one horse 17 bales of cotton, 478 bushels of corn, 984 bushels of wheat, and 1,000 pounds of oats, 40 bushels of sweet potatoes, and killed 1,723 pounds of pork.

Newbern Nut Shell: On Saturday evening, a colored boy about 12 years of age, the son of Haywood Green, who lives in James City, was passing along Pollock street, when he slipped and fell in front of Messrs. Geo. Allen & Co's store, his head striking the pavement with such force as to render him unconscious. He was taken up and carried into the store and so far recovered as to be able to walk to his home. During the night he suffered considerably with his head and died on Sunday.

Charlotte Observer: A friend in this city of Miss Maggie Means of Concord is in receipt of a lemon raised by that young lady. It is twelve and a half inches one way and fourteen another. It weighs one and a fourth pounds and is a remarkable lemon to be raised anywhere, especially as far north as Concord.

A striking circumstance in the wood distribution Sunday evening was the fact that a number of colored men declined to go to work unloading and loading until they were shamed into it by several gentlemen of the city stripping their coats and going into it with a will. This is especially remarkable when it is remembered that \$200 of the money with which this wood is being procured is the donation of the Democratic executive committee of the city and that by far the largest part of those seeking relief are colored.

News and Observer: The residence of Judge J. L. Henry, near Asheville, was burned a few days since. Loss about \$5,000, with no insurance. The first slight ride between Clinton and Warsaw, of which there is any record, was taken yesterday by our energetic friend Mr. Stephen G. Worth. We hear of two contested seats in the Legislature. Mr. Foy, from Onslow, contests the seat of Mr. Ward, the member with the certificate. Mr. Brower, of Surry, contests the seat of Mr. Hampton. The two colored representatives in the lower House of the Legislature, Hicks from Washington, and Robbins from Bertie counties, being unable to reach this city by the Blackwater route, on account of that river's being frozen over, determined upon coming via Williamston and Tarboro. Arriving at Williamston Sunday, and failing to procure a conveyance, they set out on foot at 7 o'clock, p. m. for Tarboro, a distance of thirty-two miles, reaching the latter place in time for the train next morning. This is what we call eastern grit.
