

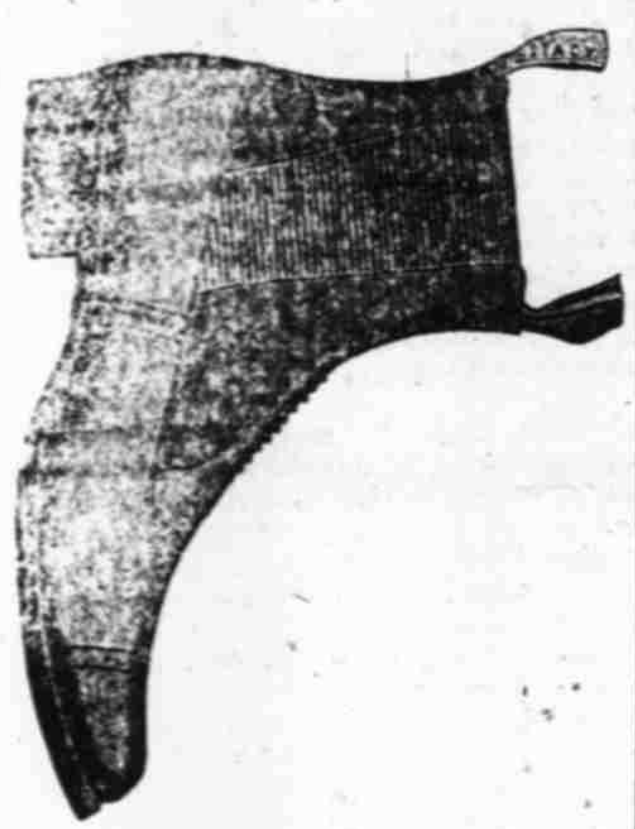

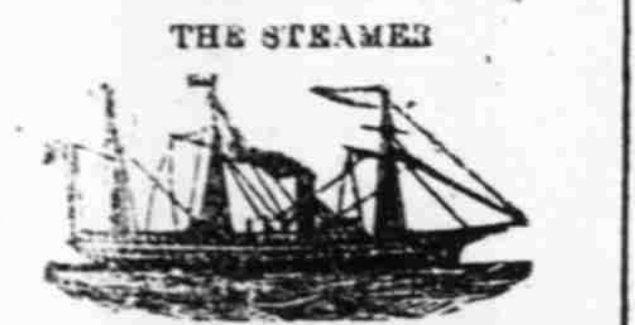

The old freshet had fallen off ten feet but yesterday morning, at Fayetteville, the river was again rising rapidly, eight feet more having been reported at that time. The bonds are being bought in large amounts by our most prominent business men. When the present city government took charge of the affairs of the city, Wilmington city 8 per cent. bonds were flat at 60 cents on the dollar, but now they are stiff and are above par with none on the market.

At the Opera House To-night

A rare treat is in store for our citizens at the Opera House to-night. The best local talent will take part in the concert and Mr. VanLaer's well known ability is enough to ensure the greatest pleasure to those who attend. Capt. Ward's Bond
Our supposition was that Capt. Ward, the new Sheriff of Pender county, gave a bond for \$30,000 on Monday last but since an article we publish elsewhere was in type a gentleman who was at Burgaw on Monday tells us that the amount in all for which the sureties are held is \$47,000. The bond is said to be as good as can be gotten up for a like amount anywhere in North Carolina.

Election of Field Officers.
The annual meeting of the company officers of the 2d Regiment N. C. S. G., for the election of field officers, was held in Charlotte during the forenoon of yesterday, the 11th inst.

Captain J. M. Davis, Co. H., of Mecklenburg, senior officer present, was called to the chair and Lieutenant James C. Munds, Co. C, Wilmington Light Infantry, was made Secretary. A committee, appointed to ascertain the number of votes present and by proxy, reported 28 out of a possible 37 present and by proxy. The meeting then proceeded to the election of officers with the following result: Col. Albert H. Worth, of Fayetteville, was elected Colonel, First Lieutenant Thomas C. James, of the Wilmington Light Infantry, Lieutenant Colonel, and Capt. J. M. Davis, of Mecklenburg, Major. There being no further business the meeting after a harmonious session adjourned sine die.

Fire at Smithville.
We regret to learn that a disastrous fire occurred at Smithville this morning, destroying the dwelling of Mr. S. M. Robbins, together with its contents, including a trunk in which Mr. Robbins had \$2,000 in money laid away, the result of years of honest toil at his trade in striking the anvil, Mr. Robbins being a blacksmith by trade. We have since learned that Mr. R. once kept his money in bank and had the misfortune to lose his deposit there also, since which time he has preferred to become his own banker, with the unfortunate result above stated. Cruel fate sometimes pursues relentlessly the same individual, as we herewith have an instance.

The Weather this Year.
Vennor makes in his almanac for 1881 the following specific predictions: Probabilities for January, 1881: Blockades of snow in the United States about the 7th and 8th; mild spell from January 18th to February 12th; March 9 and 10, gales probable around New York and Boston, and snow storms. In April a snowfall on the 4th or 5th, but spring will be well advanced by the 15th. In May, after the 10th, hot weather; on the 13th and 15th thunder storms. June, warm till 11th, then cold till 20th; 24th and 26th hot. July, cold on 13th, 20th, 23d and 31st; hot on 4th, 9th, 11th, 16th, 17th, 23th and 26th. August 4th and 5th will be cold. In September the centre of the month will be its warmest part. October will open cold; November will be muddy, with little frost; December will be the warmest ever known. Let our readers cut this out and verify these predictions.

Pender's New Sheriff.
We are glad to learn that Capt. A. C. Ward, the newly appointed Sheriff of Pender county, has given his bond as such. He filed it in full on Monday, in the sum of \$30,000, and the securities are all excellent. He has also qualified and will enter at once on the discharge of his duties.

Capt. Ward relieves Sheriff A. H. Paddison and we trust that he will succeed in giving as much satisfaction during his term as that gentleman has given. Sheriff Paddison has, indeed, proven one of the best officers in the State, an assertion which is not merely written here in compliment to a retiring official, but because the facts bear us out in what we say. At the last term of Pender County Superior Court, both the Judge and the Solicitor took occasion to compliment him on the unwavering fidelity and seal he has displayed during his term of office. Capt. Ward will have a noble example to emulate.

Exports Foreign

Nor. barque *Charles Northcote* cleared to-day for Bremen with 1,669 bales of cotton, shipped by Messrs Williams & Murchison.
Schr. *Lavolta* cleared for Barbadoes, by Messrs E. Kidder & Sons with 152,340 feet lumber.

County Commissioners.
The Board of County Commissioners met in adjourned session this afternoon Chairman Smith and all the Commissioners being present.

J. C. Millis tendered his official bond as Standard Keeper in the sum of \$200, with Jas. F. Stotter and Chas. M. Bonham as sureties, which was accepted and Mr. Millis was duly qualified.

The following was ordered by the Board: It appearing to the satisfaction of the Board that the Register has failed to collect the tax on purchase of liquor according to law, he is hereby instructed to notify all such parties to come forward and reform their list in conformity with the law, he having collected only 2 1/2 per cent. for State and 2 1/2 per cent for county for purchases from 1st July to 1st October, 1880, whereas, 5 per cent. is the legal tax. It was ordered by the Board that the Committee on Public Buildings be authorized to erect an additional building on the Poor House premises at a price not exceeding \$300.
Adjourned.

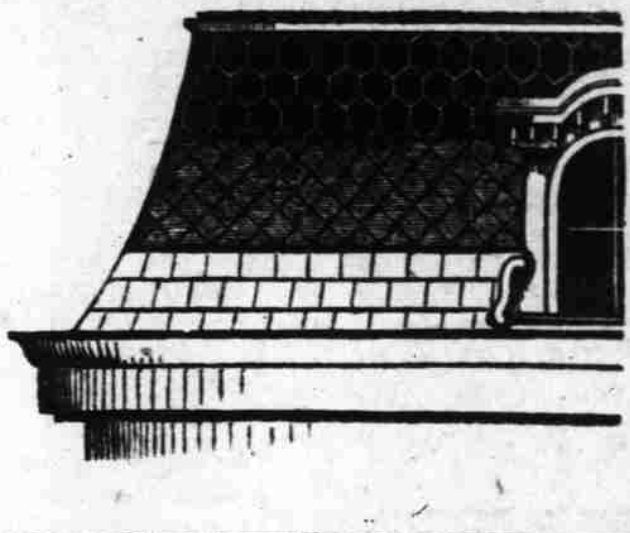
