

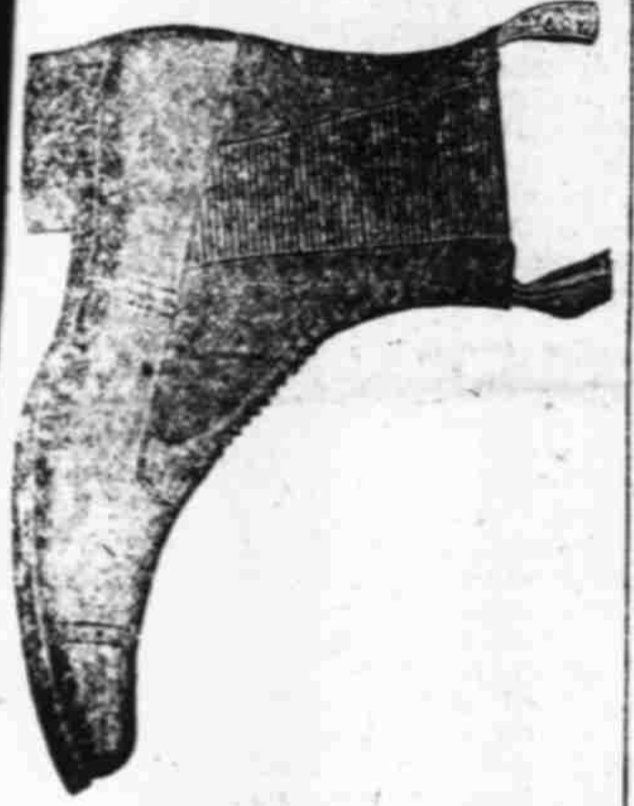

Census Footings.
