The Entertainment Last Night.

The large audience who were present at the Opera House last night were certainly not disappointed in their expectations. It was one of the most critical as well as one of the largest audiences of the season and if there were any there who were not delighted with the entertainment we have yet to hear from them.

The programme was divided into two sections—one the old folks of 1781 and the other the young folks of 1881. The first was the concert and the second the operetta. In the concert the parts were sustained by six ladies and six gentlemen. Mrs. J. W. Cameron, Mrs. J. E. Lippitt, Mrs. Jas. A. Willard, Mrs. C. H. Robinson, Mrs. L. A. Angel and Miss Sallie Holmes and Messrs. J. E. Lippitt, C. H. Robinson, N. B. Rankin, Jos. H. Waters and L. T. Bowen. The songs which were sung were those of the olden time and the characters were most appropriately sustained in costumes and in representation. One of the ladies wore a bonnet which was once her grandmother's and one of the gentlemen was clad in a costume which was made fifty years ago. During the rendition of the various pieces in the concert the appreciation of the audience was repeatedly testified and in some instances they refused to be satisfied until the demand for an encore was responded to. The instrumental music for the concert was rendered entirely by Mrs. M. P. Taylor, at the piano on the stage.

The closing piece was a "hymn to auld lang syne," in which the audience were invited to join (but which they did not do) and the curtain was rung down amid enthusiastic applause.

The intermission between the first and second parts was occupied by Mr. E. D. Goodman on the piano. Those who have not heard this gentleman cannot begin to understand or appreciate his marvelous skill. He was warmly encoored and gracefully responded.

Sullivan's "Trial by Jury" was the second piece. It is simply a foolish burlesque with many laughable parts and is remarkable chiefly for being "sublimely ridiculous."

A young maiden, arrayed as a bride, sues a young man for breach of promise. A court scene is set and a jury, attired in all kinds of ridiculous costumes, is empaneled. The judge and the counsel and the defendant arrive and then the plaintiff, accompanied by twelve young maidens, arrived on the stage.

The trial is begun and the twelve bridesmaids act a very important part. Occasionally, to the scandal of the Court, they dash across the stage to cajole the jury. At one time they place wreaths on their heads; at another they kneel and implore a verdict for their friend. Of course this verdict, when rendered, is for the plaintiff but the defendant refuses to wed the plaintiff. Thereupon the Judge dashes aside his papers, leaves the Bench and hurries to the front where he himself pays court to the young lady and is very promptly accepted. Then there is a grand chorus wherein the congratulations of the defendant in the suit are very prominent, all are happy and the curtain falls.

There is not much in the piece, but what there is was brought out very happily last night. Miss Josie Myers, as the plaintiff and bride, was charmingly arrayed, and her appreciation and rendition of the character was as accurate as if she had given it months of study. Mr. F. H. Clark made an excellent Judge, and Mr. D. B. Mitchell, as counsel for the plaintiff, Mr. J. G. Bradley, as defendant, and Mr. F. B. Lippitt as usher, merited and received the warm plaudits of the audience. The music for the operetta was from a piano, violin and bass viol, Mrs. Taylor at the former and Prof. Rieman and Ortman at the latter.

By special request, the entertainment is to be repeated to-morrow evening. We understand that over one hundred seats have already been reserved. The box sheet is now at Heinberger's.

In the House, on Tuesday, a bill to authorize the Commissioners of Onslow county to levy a special tax was introduced and referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. McIntire had been to Lumberton and had ridden home in the rain and upon entering his house he was met by a member of his family and was told that his mother was dying. Mrs. McIntire was a very aged lady and her death was not unexpected. Mr. McIntire retired to his room to put on dry clothing, when he suddenly expired. Mother and son died about the same time. Mr. McIntire was highly respected and was one of Robeson's best citizens. He was about fifty years of age.

The Value of Rare Coins.

At a public sale of rare coins at Baltimore, Maryland, last week, for a United States cent of 1793, \$38 was paid; a half-dime of 1802 brought \$20; three cents of 1793, but imperfect, were sold at \$7, \$4.75, and \$4.50, respectively; a United States cent of 1799 was knocked down at \$4.25; half dollars of various dates, from 1795 to 1852, sold at from \$1.20 to \$3.60 each; dimes of 1796 brought \$4 and \$3.30, while half cents of 1794 to 1861 brought prices ranging from 55 to 70 cents; an 1804 cent \$11.75; small proof sets of one cent, two cents, three cents, and five cents pieces brought \$8.80; United States dollars, \$1.20 to \$4 for favorite dates; sets of postal currency—5, 10, 25 and 50 cents—brought \$1.50 per set. The sales were well attended, and in two evenings 727 lots were disposed of.
