The House Committee on Commerce has voted to make an appropriation for Mississippi River improvements and for the reservoir system.

One passenger is killed by the railroads for every 41,778,775 miles traveled, and one is either killed or wounded for every 11,374,633 miles.

Chicago is the only American city in which Bernhard has not, thus far in her tour, been assailed from the pulpit, and her receipts there were the smallest.

The Senate Committee on Commerce will report favorably Coupling's bill authorizing the construction of a railway bridge across the Niagara at Grand Island, near Tonawanda.

The Canadian trade and navigation returns for the past year show an increase of trade with Great Britain over that of 1879 of \$13,018,438, and a decrease in trade with the United States of \$8,207,763.

Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Susan B. Anthony, and Mary A. Stuart had a hearing before the Delaware Senate and House on Wednesday evening on a pending bill to strike the word "male" from the State constitution.

A bill was recently introduced in Congress authorizing the Public Printer to reprint an edition of 50,000 copies of each of the four volumes on the "Medical and Surgical History of the War," heretofore issued. The fifth volume is now printing, and should the bill become a law these books will be gratuitously distributed by members of Congress.

Knoxville, Tennessee, was laid out in 1791, and named in honor of General Knox, of revolutionary fame. The first Territorial Legislature assembled there in 1794, the constitutional convention in 1795, and the first State Legislature in 1796. The seat of government was removed to Nashville in 1810.

An Ohio paper proposes to number the hours of a day and night consecutively from 1 to 24, or from midnight to midnight, thus doing away with a. m. and p. m. in railway time tables and elsewhere. The advocate of the proposed new method says that there is no more reason for having two 12 o'clocks in one day than there is for two twelve-mile posts on a twenty-four mile railroad.

**Exports Foreign.**  
Four vessels cleared foreign at this port today. German barque *Constantin*, for Cardiff, takes out 3,044 barrels rosin, shipped by Messrs Paterson, Downing & Co.; German barque *Anna*, for Hamburg, 3,150 barrels rosin, shipped by Messrs J. R. Blossom & Evans; Swedish barque *Israel*, for Liverpool, 842 bales cotton and 1,000 barrels rosin, shipped by Messrs Alex. Sprunt & Son; and Swedish barque *Thorgny*, for Bristol, 2,892 barrels rosin, shipped by Messrs Alex. Sprunt & Son.
