## Two Smart for them.

Last evening, about 7 1/2 o'clock, Mr. H. A. Glameyer, who keeps a grocery store on North Water street, missed a piece of dry salted pork, weighing some 10 or 12 pounds, from the door of his store, where it was suspended on a hook, just before the departure of a colored woman with a basket on her arm from the store a few minutes previous. Starting in pursuit he found the woman with her basket on her arm in a butcher shop corner of Market and Second streets, and with the aid of a policeman compelled the woman to return to his store. "The woman was quite indignant at first and used some very profane language and it was not until the persuasive argument of a policeman was brought into effect that she consented to yield and return to the grocery. But first of all she desired to leave her basket, which, by the way, was covered with a towel. But this was objected to and the woman and basket were escorted to Mr. Glameyer's store, on Water street. But an examination after reaching the store revealed nothing in the basket but what belonged to the woman, and the 12 pounds of meat was still missing. Shortly afterwards, however, a policeman picked up the piece of pork on the corner of Market and Front streets, on the outer edge of the pavement, very near the gutter. If the woman purloined the meat in the first instance she was smart enough to drop it unseen under cover of the darkness while returning to the grocery. At any rate the Criminal Court will not have to try the case, but Glameyer has saved his pork, and the woman possibly her bacon.

## The Immigration Question.

We alluded, a week or two ago, to the fact that Col. A. Pope, General Passenger Agent of the Associated Railways of Virginia and the Carolinas, had been appointed Immigration Agent for the State of North Carolina, an appointment which, we are sure, will lead to beneficiary results. That Col. Pope possesses rare business qualifications is a fact well understood and we have every reason to believe that these will be exerted for the benefit of the cause which he has undertaken to conduct. Of course the benefit to the State and the railroads will be mutual as Col. Pope gracefully acknowledges in a circular just issued by him and from which we extract. He says:

The undersigned, as General Passenger Agent of the Associated Railways of Virginia and the Carolinas, which embraces in its system the W. & W. C. & A. Railroads, begs to advise you of the perfection of arrangements by which, under proper limitations, a complete system of settlers' and immigrants' fares from leading Eastern cities exist to each station upon the lines of Railways of this organization, and that methods are being employed to collect valuable information of unimproved lands, improved farms, sites for manufacturing purposes, supplies and location of growing hard woods, deposits of minerals, metals and building materials, together with such facts of physical attractions, accessibility to railway or water transportation or desirable markets, as will be calculated, when published (as will be periodically done) to invite the attention of immigrants and all persons seeking investments in the Southern States.

With a view of accomplishing more thoroughly and successfully the objects indicated, a complete system of co-operation with the Department of Agriculture has been arranged, and it is hoped that by our united efforts successful results may be achieved.

While it is true that the primary object to the Railways, in this matter, is improvement in passenger revenue and increased tonnage, yet results of equal or greater benefit are to be hoped for to the State at large by such comprehensive efforts as will advertise its many superior advantages, and attract thither tides of immigration that have hitherto flowed in other directions.

All information tending to promote the efficiency of matter that will be published from time to time, will be thankfully received.

## For the Review.

Mr. Editor: I am but a quiet looker on, observing but not observed in this matter of the Criminal Court which is being agitated. It strikes me forcibly that you touched the truth with a needle's point when you tersely said a few days ago that the matter of abolishing the Court or instituting a Circuit Court in its stead, is to be the work of Republicans and that the whole plot was concocted in the Radical camp, or words to that effect. If the Court is abolished the perquisites of the clerk's office will be thrown into the hands of the Clerk of the Superior Court and nothing will be saved to the county, and if a Circuit Court is established they (the Radicals) hope to elect their candidate for the Judgeship, and by the clause in the bill to establish Circuit Courts, the Clerk of the Superior Court will also be the Clerk of the Criminal Court. There are but about fifteen counties in the State which need or want Criminal Courts, and it strikes us that the remainder of the counties, 81 number, would seriously object to paying the salaries of the Judge and Solicitor of the Circuit Court. Why not let well enough alone? Has not the Criminal Court accomplished everything its most sanguine friends had hoped for? It has reduced the jail fees of the county, broken up the moonshiners, given prisoners speedy trials, rid the community of a hoard of thieves and to-day stands a terror to the evil doers in the community and is as a sentinel over the rights and property of the people of NEW HANOVER.
