WASHIGGTON, February 11 .- Mr. Hoar offered a resolution instructing the rudiciary Committee to consider and feort whether the assembling at the seat. The amendment reported from the Postoffice Appropriation Committee, ap propriating one million dollars for the establishment and encouragement of American lines of iron steamers, was ruled out by the chair yesterday as in violation of the rule which prohibits general legisiation upon appropriation bills. The pending question to-day was upon the appeal taken by Senator Macey from the chair's decision. After a long discussion the decision of the chair was overruled, the house holding by a vote of 29 to 15 that the amendment was ad missable.

Mr. Hamlin then said that the pend icg amendment had been hastily drawn up and he would offer as a substitute for it another precisely similar in effect, but more carefully worded.

The resolution provides that of the one million dollars appropriated for foreign postal service by American line steamers, one-fourth shall be applicable to ports on the Pacific coast, one-fourth to perts lying south and including l'ort. ress Monroe and ports ou the Gulf of Mexico, and one-half to perts north of Fortress Monroe.
