Legislative Locals.
In the Senate, on Monday, Mr. Scott presented a petition from certain citizens of New Hanover, praying prohibition.
Mr. Jones presented a petition from certain citizens of Onslow county, asking the appointment of justices of the peace.
The bill for the better protection of fish interests in the Cape Fear was amended by inserting "May 1st" for "April 10th," and in this condition passed its second and third readings.
In the House, Mr. Brooks, of Brunswick, presented a petition asking that the old line between Brunswick and Columbus counties be re-established.
Mr. Brooks also submitted a resolution incorporating a church in Brunswick county.
Mr. Boykin, of Sampson, introduced a bill to charter the Clinton & Faison R. R. Company, which was referred.
The bill to authorize the entry of lands belonging to the Literary Board, situated in Jones, Craven, Dare, Onslow, Tyrrell and Carteret counties, was put on its several readings and passed.
Bill to incorporate the Grand and subordinate Lodges of the Knights of Honor of North Carolina, passed its several readings.

The Park
In connection with the park to be established where the old market once stood, are to be placed two fountains. The old market site is to be enclosed and turfed, and a fountain for drinking purposes will be erected near Front street, and another near Water street, where horses can be watered. The park will beautify the street and will be a place of general resort during the summer nights. The fountains will supply a long-felt need and will prove a very great convenience to the business houses on Water, Front and Market streets. Gates will be placed on the North and South sides of the enclosure in order to let persons pass from one side of Market street to the other without going around the park.

Knights of Pythias.
The eleventh annual meeting of the Grand Lodge of the order of Knights of Pythias, held in Goldsboro last week, says the *Messenger*, closed its labors Thursday night, after a three day's session. The proceedings were of great interest to the order and pleasant and harmonious throughout. Two new Lodges were organized in the State the past year, and the membership shows an increase of nearly one hundred. The newly elected Grand Officers for the ensuing year were installed Thursday night, as follows: Grand Chancellor—J. A. Bonitz, Vice Grand Chancellor—Chas. R. Jones. Grand Prelate—Rev. Wm. Byrd. Grand Master of Exchequer—R. T. Scanlin, Grand Master at Arms—H. C. Prempert. Grand Inner Guard—S. G. Hall. Grand Outer Guard—E. V. Hawley. The following District Deputies were appointed by the Grand Chancellor, viz: For Lodge No. 1, R. S. Radcliffe; Lodge No. 4, H. C. Prempert; Lodge No. 5, Thos. H. Sutton; Lodge No. 6, Chas. Dewey; Lodge No. 8, Jas. W. Moore; Lodge 18, Chas. W. Vogeler. Mr. J. H. Shultz was appointed a special deputy. The several standing committees were announced, after which the Grand Lodge adjourned to meet in Goldsboro the 2d Tuesday of February, 1882.

Mayor Fishplate's Message.

The message of His Honor, Mayor Fishplate, as submitted by him to the Board of Aldermen on Monday evening, and published in yesterday's issue of the Review, has been carefully read and highly commended by very many of our citizens, especially the tax-paying portion. The exhibit of the financial affairs of the city is really very satisfactory and shows that the Democratic majority on the Board of Aldermen have carried out the promises of reform made for them by the party in this city. Mayor Fishplate calls attention to the fact that during the administration of affairs by the present Board of Aldermen a yearly average saving of seventy thousand dollars has been made for the benefit of the tax-payers of Wilmington, and that during the past three years the debt of the city has been reduced one hundred and twenty thousand dollars. And not only has this gratifying result been accomplished, but the taxable valuation has been reduced 37½ per cent. on real estate and 35 per cent. on merchants' license tax. As a natural result, the credit of the city, which in consequence of defaulted payments had been reduced very materially, has been revived and restored, and bonds which the present Board of Aldermen found selling at 62½ cents are now at par, and above par. The city debt is now \$514,000 as against \$634,475 as found by Mayor Fishplate when he entered upon the duties of his office in February, 1878, just three years ago. At that time the defaulted interest on the city bonds amounted, with interest on same, to \$71,600. This has all been paid and now the interest on the entire bonded debt is paid promptly in cash as it matures, January 1st and July 1st of each year.

Mayor Fishplate pays a handsome and well-deserved tribute to the co-ordinate branch of the city government, so far as the control of its finances is concerned, the Board of Audit and Finance. We think, as he does, that this is a very necessary and proper adjunct to the government of the city, and we trust that it may be perpetuated. There may come a time when their services will prove of peculiar value to the tax-payers of Wilmington. The Mayor also refers in complimentary terms to the labors of our excellent fire department; to Capt. Savage, and his assistant, Mr. Fowler; and to the police, street, health and law departments, all of which are fully set forth in the message.

Counterfeit Gold Coin.
Although there is very little gold coin in circulation the counterfeiters have set afloat a bogus quarter eagle which is about as nearly worthless a piece of money of its pretended value as can well be. The imitation quarter eagle is made of a peculiar composition, has a clear silvery ring, is electro-gilt, and contains about ten cents worth of silver. Stereokeepers and others who have not handled much gold recently are not unlikely to be deceived by this cheap imitation of a two and a half piece.

An Unfounded Rumor.
There was a rumor on the streets today to the effect that the Executive Committee had met and made nominations for Aldermen from the different wards, and had also "fixed up the city slate." We have investigated the matter and found that there is no foundation whatever for the report and that the committee has not met nor thought of meeting for any such purpose. They propose to assign the time for ward meetings to be held and then let the people of the wards make their own selections.
