**Sixteen Years Ago.**  
 Sixteen years ago to-day the Federal troops marched into Wilmington. The Confederate forces evacuated the city the evening before. At about 7 o'clock in the morning of this day sixteen years ago, the Federal cavalry halted at the corner of Second and Princess streets, in front of the old jail building, which had been used by the Confederates as a prison. When the cavalry drew up in front of the old jail several Confederate officers were at the residence of a gentleman not more than fifty yards distant taking breakfast. A son of the gentleman ran in and notified the officers that "the Yankees were out there." The clatter of teeth, banging of sword scabbards, hasty gulping down of food and unceremonious retreat of the officers over back fences was but fan to the "young son" who, to add to the discomforture of the retreaters, kept yelling "the Yankees are coming." The officers made Little Bridge and retired under its friendly shade until the Yankees got over when they took to the woods and reached their command at North East.
