Personal.
Capt. Jno. W. Hinson, of New York, arrived here last night and will go up to Duplin county to-morrow to rejoin his family, who are there on a visit. Capt. Hinson is now at the head of the firm of Hinson & Blount, cotton brokers in New York city, with Mr. R. H. Rountree as special partner.

Underwriters' Report
The report of the Local Board of Underwriters, which has just been prepared by the Secretary, Mr. W. J. Gordon, presents some very interesting features.

The report is of losses sustained in the city for the six months ending January 31st, 1881. During that period the estimated value of property destroyed is \$3,720,97, on which insurance money has been paid to the amount of \$3,203,46. The showing is a remarkable one, especially as compared with the corresponding period for 1879, when the amount paid out was \$74,184.44.

The number of fires recorded during the period alluded to was 23, on four of which there was no insurance loss; of the others, in one the insurance paid amounted to \$1,396.33 and on the remaining eighteen it was but \$1,807.13.

The losses to the agencies here were, as follows: Atkinson & Manning, \$239.78; DeRosset & Northrop, \$361.75; Norwood Giles, \$304.22; W. L. Smith & Co., \$16.15; Wilmington Mutual, \$1,188.80; Jno. W. Gordon & Bro., \$592.76.

The causes of the fires are recorded as follows: From sparks on roof, 8; sparks from locomotive in cotton, 1; sparks from stove pipe in cotton, 1; sparks from cigar in cloth, 1; defective flues and stove pipes, 2; furnace of mill, 1; gas jet, 2; lamp, 1; lighter in cigar store, 1; ignition of broom while sweeping hearth, 1; lightning, 1; incendiary, 2; unknown, 4. There was but one false alarm during the period.

The estimated value of property destroyed by fire during the year 1880 was \$49,620.21, on which insurance money was paid to the amount of \$36,251.28. The insurance paid in 1879 was \$38,566.06.

Wilmington Steam Fire Engine Company No. 1.

An adjourned meeting of the honorary and retired members of this Company was held at Rankin Hall last night.

Captain John L. Boatwright was made permanent chairman and Mr. P. W. Gause secretary.

A committee, consisting of Mr. W. P. Oldham, Capt. A. L. DeRosset and Mr. N. B. Rankin, was appointed to make arrangements for a reunion of the Company and a supper or collation to be given complimentary to the active members. The meeting adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

As the anniversary of the Company falls in Lent this year, the 22nd of March, those having the matter in hand have deemed it best to postpone the collation until a few days after Good Friday, which falls on the 15th of April. The supper complimentary to the active, by the retired, members was suggested at the last anniversary of the Company by Mr. James C. Stevenson, whereupon the retired members present met and took the initial steps towards furthering their deliberations.
