and adopted resolutions requesting the
Legislature, in case the bill entitled "An
Act for the Better Protection of Fish-

any manner be construed to restrain or
impair the powers of the Board of
Health in carrying out the necessary
sanitary and police regulations in the
city.

A Stupendous Enterprise.

The following extract from a letter,

scheme is to quietly without exciting

neighborhood of the North Pole. When
this is well in hand and there is no chance
for outsiders to secure any vacant lots
these money kings propose to lay a wire
from San Francisco to Japan, thus form-
ing a complete telegraphic line around
the earth—roughly near the equator.
When you remember that the electric
currents of the earth at present run from
pole to pole, or longitudinally, the effect
of this defiance of nature's laws will at
once be obvious to a scientist like your-
self. If the needle will not go to the
pole, the pole must go to the needle.
A tremendous cataclysm will be pro-
duced, the earth being switched around
a quarter of the circle, and one of the
temperate zones will don our ulsters and
start our cigars by the northern lights
while the frisky Esquimaux will cultivate

Mr. A. H. VanBokkelen, President of
the Chamber of Commerce, returned here
last night from Washington City, where
he has been for some days past in the in-
terest of the river and harbor appropria-
tion for this port. He is, we are pleased
to say, confident that the appropriation
for the Cape Fear, as reported by the
Senate Committee, will pass the House,
as it has already passed the Senate.

Harbor Master's Report.

Capt. Jos. Price, Harbor Master, re-
ports the arrival at this port last month
of 53 vessels, with a total of 17,946 tons.
Of these, 27 vessels were American, with
9,211 tons, and 26 were foreign, with
8,735 tons. Of the former, 4 were
steamers, 3 were brigs and 20 were
schooners, and of the latter 2 were
schooners, 7 were brigs and 16 were bar-
ques.

**Meeting of Produce Exchange—Cape
Fear & Yadkin Valley R. R.**

A meeting of the Produce Exchange was
held this morning to take some action
in regard to the bill now pending be-
fore the Legislature advocating the sale
of the State's interest in the Cape Fear
& Yadkin Valley R. R.

The meeting was called to order by the
President, Mr. E. E. Calder, and Capt. N.
F. Thompson was requested to act as
Secretary.

Gen. Imboden's letters to Gov. Jarvis
and the *News and Observer* were read
by the President.

Hon. A. H. VanBokkelen spoke
warmly in favor of the passage of the
bill and thought that the Company,
which is a very large one, represented by
Gen. Imboden would fulfill their con-
tract. He thought that their proposi-
tion was a very binding one on them and
is but an index of their good faith in the
matter.

Dr. A. J. DeRosset thought the propo-
sition one of great importance to this
city and advocated the sale of the road
to Gen. Imboden.

Capt. D. E. Murchison opposed the
sale and thought that it would be to the
interest of the state to allow the matter
to stand as it is. He thinks that the only
chance of eventually getting the
road to this city was in leaving it in the
hands of its present owners. He says
that he feels convinced that the parties
who wish the State to
give them the option of buying the
road are irresponsible and that their
object in getting the option is specula-
tive.

Dr. DeRosset moved that a commit-
tee, consisting of Hon. A. H. VanBok-
kelen and Messrs R. E. Calder and B.
G. Worth, be requested to go to Raleigh
and advocate the passage of the bill, with
proper restrictions, and to see that there
could be no transfer of the stock if the
bill should be passed.

Amended by Mr. Wm. Calder that the
committee be sent uninstruced and to
represent the interest of this city in the
matter. Carried.

The sense of the committee is that
with the light now before them it would
be to the interest of the State and of
this city for the State to sell its stock to
Gen. Imboden for the company which he
represents. If after they arrive in Ral-
eigh should see any cause to change their
views they could do so.

The gentlemen composing the commit-
tee will leave to-morrow morning.
