Death of Dr. W. A. B. Norcom

Mr Scott's Market Bill.

We understand, from telegrams received here this morning, that the bill known as the bill for the protection of farmers and fishermen, introduced by Mr. Scott, passed the House last night, as it had previously passed the Senate. There are conflicting theories here as regards the provisions and effects of this bill. Two days ago we stated, on good authority, that the bill was not such as the taxpayers of this city would commend and that its provisions would interfere seriously with the due administration of the police and sanitary regulations, and now we are shown a telegram from a gentleman of this city, now in Raleigh, which says that the bill does not interfere with the sanitary regulations and that it will commend itself to a large majority of our people, especially the poor. We await further developments.

The following telegram from City Attorney Darby, who is now in Raleigh, gives the latest information on the subject:

RALEIGH, N. C., March 2, 1881.

Gran. Attraction.

The increasing splendor of Venus must attract the attention of every one who glances at the western sky after sundown. She is fast approaching the earth, and a slight magnifying power will show her as a beautiful crescent. It is a curious fact that the great brilliancy of Venus has baffled the astronomers who have sought to learn something of the physical aspect of the planet. The most exquisitely constructed telescopes are unable to penetrate the dazzling veil thrown around this planet by the sun light reflected from its surface. This is the more disappointing, because there are many reasons for believing that Venus is in a condition more nearly resembling that of the earth than any other planet. The scanty records of the glimpses that astronomers have caught of mountains and continent outlines upon Venus serve only to excite the curiosity of readers.

In this connection, it would be well to call attention to the fact that, on the evening of the 21st inst., our people will have an opportunity of seeing three of the most brilliant and illustrious stars the world has ever known. Their renown is even greater than that of Salvia, Booth, or Barrett; indeed, they are so well known, that they have no advanced agent ahead of them, and this will probably be the only notice of their forthcoming.

More mention of their names is all that is necessary; we refer to Venus, Jupiter and Saturn. The most wonderful part of the exhibition will take place at 12 o'clock when Venus will be in conjunction with Jupiter.

The latter will be attended with his usual retinue of satellites, and Saturn will be decked with rings of the most dazzling brilliancy. Venus will give a matinee on the afternoon of the same day.

Attempted Arson.

An attempt was made last night to burn the old frame store on Front street, just north of the new market, owned by the Walker estate and occupied by Mr. Jacob Duffs. The incendiary saturated a plank on the rear end of the building with oil and then set fire to it. For some unaccountable reason, perhaps the oil was watered, the fire burned very slowly and then went out. There is no clue as to the perpetrator of the crime.

Exports During February.

During the month of February, just closed, as we glean from the books at the Custom House, there were exported hence 4,536 bales of cotton, 37,852 barrels of rosin, 2,853 barrels of tar and pitch, 75,358 gallons of spirits turpentine, 2,322,000 feet lumber, and 514,000 shingles.

The cotton was valued at \$234,871 the rosin at \$62,817; the tar and pitch at \$5,042; the spirits turpentine at \$33,158 the lumber at \$38,544 and the shingles at \$3,622.

Court Plaster.

The *Scientific American* gives the following directions for making this useful article: Soak isinglass in a little warm water for seventy-four hours; then evaporate nearly all the water by a gentle heat; dissolve the residue in a little dilute alcohol; and strain the whole through a piece of open linen. The strained mass should be a stiff jelly when cold. Now stretch a piece of silk or sarsenet on a wooden frame, and fix it tight with tacks or pack-thread. Melt the jelly and apply it to the silk thinly and evenly with a badger hair brush. A second coating must be applied when the first has dried. When both are dry, apply over the whole surface two or three coatings of the balsam of Peru. Plaster thus made is very pliable, and never breaks.

St. David's Day.

Yesterday was the festal day of St. David, the patron saint of Wales, who is said by some to have been the son of a Prince of the ancient regal line of Cunedda Wledig, and by others to have been the son of Xanthus. He died at a very advanced age about the year 544. In 519 he was elevated to the archbishopric of Caerleon, and after his death was buried in the Cathedral at Menevia. He is described as having been "a doctrine to all, a guide to the religious, a life to the poor, a support to orphans, a protection to widows, a father to the fatherless, a rule to monks and a model to teachers."

The observance of the day was long countenanced by royalty. The emblem of Wales is the leek, which tradition says the Welsh soldiers were directed to wear in their hats to distinguish them from their enemies, and in memory of a great victory obtained over the Saxons. Gilt leeks are still carried in procession by the Welsh branches of friendly societies, and the national badge may be seen decorating the mantelpieces of Welsh houses on St. David's day.
