day foot up 205 bales.

The cold wave is with us. A few  
flakes of snow fell this forenoon.

No interments in Oakdale and Belle-  
vue Cemeteries during the past week.

The United States District Court con-  
venes in this city on Monday, May 2nd.

Cotton has dropped off a trifle and  
rosin and tar have advanced correspond-  
ingly.

The Register of Deeds issued six mar-  
riage licenses during the week, all to  
colored couples.

Country carts took up their stand at  
the old mud market this morning and a  
butcher shop was opened on Market  
street.

The butchers are opposed to the "Poor  
Man's Bill." They think that the bill  
will make many of them poor men if the  
bill is enforced.

A man applied at the Register's office  
during the week, stating that he wanted  
to get married, but as he did not have  
\$2.40 the license was not granted.

The hucksters are happy again, for  
they can line Market street with boxes,  
barrels, etc., and no one can interfere  
with their selling meats, provisions, etc.

By the terms of the "Poor Man's  
Bill" (?) dealers in grain, peanuts, rice  
and cereals of all kinds, cotton, hay, etc.,  
and all other farm products are exempt  
from taxation.

But one cargo was shipped foreign to-  
day: It consists of 176,112 feet lumber  
per schooner *Annie M. Richardson*, for  
Point a Petre, Gaudaloupe, and was ship-  
ped by Messrs. E. Kidder & Sons.

The Legislature has put Wilmington  
down on a level with Washington, Har-  
bor, Lumerton, Rocky Point and Duplin  
Cross Roads. Now let it (the Legisla-  
ture) step down to its own level, if it can  
find it.

Messrs. Van Bokkelen, Worth and  
Calder, the Committee on the Produce  
Exchange, appointed to visit Raleigh on  
the matter of the sale of the State's  
stock in the C. F. & Y. V. R. R., have  
returned to the city.

There was nearly as much cotton re-  
ceived at this port to-day as there was  
during the first week in March of last  
year and very near twice as much was  
received here yesterday as during that  
week.

"Farms and Fishermen."  
The General Assembly of North Caro-  
lina do enact:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful  
for the Board of Aldermen, or the proper  
authorities of the city of Wilmington,  
Washington and Harboro, to impose or  
collect any tax on or for the sale of fresh  
meats, beef, pork, mutton, game, fish,  
oysters, clams, garden truck and all farm  
products, on any of the streets or alleys  
thereof, from wagons, carts, shops or  
stores or to in any manner interfere with  
the sale of the above named articles.

Sec. 2. Any person or persons violat-  
ing the provisions of the above section of  
this act shall be deemed guilty of a mis-  
demeanor, and, on conviction before any  
Justice of the Peace, be fined not less  
than fifty dollars and imprisoned not less  
than thirty days for each and every of-  
fense.

Sec. 3. That all laws and clauses of  
laws in conflict with this act are hereby  
repealed.

Sec. 4. This act shall be in force from  
the date of its ratification.

## "The Poor Man's Bill."

We publish elsewhere that which has  
been so pathetically termed "The Poor  
Man's Bill." The provisions of this bill  
were not known here until it had become  
a law. We tried hard several days ago  
to get a copy but could not. It has  
excited much unfavorable comment, be-  
cause of its extraordinary provisions, and  
although it is said to have been com-  
mended and endorsed by several members  
of the legal fraternity, yet we venture  
the assertion that it is not worth the  
paper it is written on. If Mayor Fish-  
plate does his full duty he will at once  
contest the bill and carry it before the  
Supreme Court to test its constitution-  
ality. It will be thrown out there, as sure  
as the sun shines.

Our objection to the bill is that the  
thing has been overdone. We do not  
object to the sale of fish and oysters and  
country produce from carts anywhere  
in the city after market hours and under  
proper restrictions, but we do object to  
a measure which will rob the city of its  
revenues, render nugatory the powers  
of the Board of Health, and  
allow the sidewalks and en-  
trances to residences, as well as places  
of business, to be blocked up by those  
who may select any particular spot they  
please whereon to vend their wares and  
require no license and pay no tax to sell.  
The hucksters are hereafter to have con-  
trol of the city. They can pile up their  
dry-goods boxes anywhere—before a  
place of business, or a dwelling-house or  
a school-house, even a church, and there  
obstruct the street completely, and no  
man can say them nay. They can for  
that matter, stretch a line of boxes and  
fish carts across Market street or across  
Water street, or across any thorough-  
fare they may select and totally block  
traffic, and yet the man who lays his  
hands on their sacred bodies or their  
still more sacred wares, must pay a fine  
of \$50 and go to prison for 30 days.—  
The penalty is not \$30 or 80 days, but  
it is \$50 and 30 days, and there is no  
discretionary power anywhere to limit or  
to qualify the penalty. It must be  
enforced. The police have no authority  
and the Mayor and Board of Aldermen  
no discretion. The Board of Health is  
also paralyzed. Rotten meats and fish  
may be offered for sale under a hot July  
sun until the stench becomes intolerable  
and there is no remedy whatever or any-  
where. There is no exaggeration in  
these statements; they are all plain, un-  
varnished facts, according to the "Poor  
Man's Bill."

## Handsome Testimonial.

The members of North State Lodge  
No. 222, I. O. B. B., last  
evening presented Mr. J. I.  
Macks, Grand President of the Fifth Di-  
vision of that order, with a handsome  
gold badge, in honor of his recent elec-  
tion to the highest office in the gift of  
the Grand Lodge. The badge is the  
handsomest we have ever seen. It is in  
three pieces, linked together with gold  
chains. The top piece bears the letters  
in enamel I. O. B. B. The second piece,  
pendant from the first, has the name, J. I.  
Macks. The third piece, which is star  
shaped, has embossed on its surface some  
of the symbols of the order and the seven  
branch chandeliers resting above the ark.  
In each branch of the chandeliers is a  
small diamond. On the reverse of the  
star is the inscription "Presented to  
Brother J. I. Macks by his brethren of  
North State Lodge No. 222, I. O. B. B.,  
March 4, 1881." The presentation speech  
was made by Mr. Leopold Brunhild in a  
very tender and feeling manner. After  
the presentation a dance and collation  
was given Mr. Macks by the members of  
the Lodge.

Venor's Probabilities for March.  
Mr. Venor, the Canadian weather  
prophet, indulges in the following predic-  
tions for the weather during the month  
of March:  
"This March will come in like a lion.  
The beginning of the month will be char-  
acterized by storms of wind, which will  
culminate during the second week in  
heavy gales throughout the United  
States. On the 2d there will be heavy  
snow storms in Quebec and Montreal.  
On the 8th snow storms are probable in  
St. Louis, Kansas, Indian Territory and  
Arkansas. On the 9th and 10th gales  
are probable around New York, Boston  
and intervening points, and snow storms  
pretty general.

"About the 7th and 8th storms of  
wind and snow may be expected, followed  
by rain and sleet. This condition of  
things will terminate in a cold dip about  
the 13th or 14th, with a snow fall. On  
the 13th cold weather may be expected  
in Toronto, Sarina and other points west.  
"St. Patrick's Day will arrive during  
the cold snap in Ontario, and Quebec and  
the Northern States, while rain, snow  
and sleet will prevail southward as far  
as Washington, and snow and rain will  
fall in the Canadian maritime provinces.  
With the beginning of the third week of  
this month general snow falls, from the  
lower provinces westward to Chicago,  
are likely to prevail. They will be suc-  
ceeded by mild and spring-like weather,  
with indications of rain and snow, while  
heavy rain storms will probably set in in  
the lower provinces and portions of the  
United States."

"During the last week heavy rains will  
prevail throughout Canada, with a prob-  
able snow fall in the direction of St.  
Louis, Missouri, and easterly gales on  
the Gulf of St. Lawrence. There will  
be signs of the opening of navigation in  
Ontario, while snow falls will be prob-  
able at points west of Montreal. On the  
15th heavy rains will be likely in the  
Lower Provinces and Quebec, and  
through portions of the United States;  
and from the 20th to the end of the  
month there will be wet weather in Hal-  
ifax. On the 30th the weather will be  
blastery with sleet and snow possibly, at  
many points east and west. The old  
adage about March when it comes in like  
a lion will not be falsified, as the month  
probably will end lame-like.
