The General Assembly of North Carotina do enact:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for the Board of Aldermen, or the proper authornies of the city of Wilmington, Washington and Parboro, to impose or collect any tax on or for the sale of fresh meats, beef, pork, mutton, game, fish oysters, clams, garden truck and all farm thereof, from wagons, carts, shops or Nixon. stores or to in any manner interiere with the sale of the above named articles.

Sec. 2. Any person or persons violating the provisions of the above section of ney, Louis L. Nixon. this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, on conviction before any Justice of the Peace, be fined not less

Sec. 3. That all laws and clauses of laws in coeffict with this act are hereby Sec. 4. This act shall be in force from the date of its ratification.

"The Poor Man's Bill."

We publich elsewhere that which has been so pathetically termed "The Poor Man's Bill." The provisions of this bill were not known here until it had become a law. We tried hard several days ago to get a copy but could not. It has excited much unfavorable comment, because of its extraordinary provisions, and although it is said to have been commended and endorsed by several members of the legal fraternity, yet we venture the assertion that it is not worth the paper it is written on. If Mayor Fishblate does his full duty he will at once contest the bill and carry it before the Supreme Court to test its constitutionality. It will be thrown out there, as sure
