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THE NEW PRESIDENT.

President Garfield's inaugural is an able document. It was evidently prepared with the most extreme care and promises well, so far as the general interests of the country are concerned.

These are the salient points of the inaugural. They read well, but promises are not performances. If the new President will act up to them he will certainly deserve well in many things from the country.

The following is the new Cabinet, as named by President Garfield and confirmed by the Senate on Saturday: Secretary of State, James O. Blaine, of Maine; Secretary of the Treasury, William Windom, of Minnesota; Secretary of War, Robert Lincoln, of Illinois; Secretary of the Navy, W. H. Hunt, of Louisiana; Attorney-General, Wayne MacVeagh, of Pennsylvania; Postmaster-General, Thomas L. James, of New York; Secretary of the Interior, S. S. Kirkwood, of Iowa.

It may be classed as fair. Blaine is an old hand at the political bellows, although it is his first appearance in the Cabinet. He is far preferable to us of the South than would Conkling have been; Windom is an Ohio man and has had a continual Congressional experience for thirty-two years; Robert Lincoln is simply a lawyer and the son of Abraham Lincoln and that is about all there is to say of him as yet; W. H. Hunt is a Louisianaian, a Republican, and but little known; Wayne McVeagh is odorous as one of the "visiting statesmen" to Louisiana to whom Hayes owed his four years' fraudulent term; James has been postmaster at New York for many years past and is said by those who know him best, Democrats as well as Republicans, to be not only an excellent official but a man of moderate views and of unimpeachable integrity, and Kirkwood is simply remarkable for a long political life. This is, condensed, the personal of the new cabinet.
