Of Interest.
The following regulation of the United States Treasury will be of especial interest to those whose business is subject to frequent demands for change. It is taken from the New York Sun: "Until further notice fractional silver coin and standard silver dollars will be sent by express, free of charge, if so requested, under the regulations of the Treasury Department, in sums of \$500 or any multiple thereof; or by registered mail, free of charge, if so requested, in sums of \$60 or any multiple thereof not exceeding \$300, at the risk of the person to whom sent. Correspondence pertaining to this matter should be addressed to the Treasurer of the United States, Washington, D. C."

Humpty Dumpty.
The performance last night at the Opera House of Rial's Humpty Dumpty troupe was one which was very generally approved. The house was packed and standing room was scarce, which was an irrefutable argument in favor of the low price system. The performance, as a whole, was very good, although the Humpty-Dumpty representation was not equal to that given by the Tony Denier troupe last winter. Still, it was a very good performance and received the unstinted approval of the audience. Rial Muear, the fire-king, did all that was promised for him. He actually bit red-hot iron, rubbed it on his hands, arms, face and head and licked it with his tongue, and danced on a sheet of iron red-hot from the fire. At least, that is the way it looked from the auditorium. If there was any deception it was beyond our ken to discover it. The contortions gone through with by Rial were very fine. Frank De Forrest was very entertaining with his songs and dances and witticisms and the Dog Circus was a pleasing feature of the entertainment.

The Elections.
The elections here to-day for two Aldermen from each of the five wards in the city, to serve for two years, passed off very quietly. The only excitement—and that was of a quiet nature—was in the Second Ward, where the Radicals and a few dissatisfied Democrats agreed upon a ticket composed of one from each party, R. F. Eydin and H. E. Scott, as opposed to the regular Democratic ticket. The result is not known as yet, and will not be known until some time after our paper has gone to press. And it is safe to assume that the First and Fifth Wards have gone Republican, and that the Third and Fourth have been carried by the Democrats. In the Second, as we write, the result is still in doubt, but if the Democrats lose it, it will be through default and not from any lack of strength.

The chances at 4 o'clock, as they have been all day, were decidedly in favor of the Democrats, the only drawback with them being the difficulty in calling out their full registered strength. If this can be done the day will be theirs, as they are numerically superior to the combined opposition. We trust that the "bloody Second" will come out all right and that the city is to remain under a wise and beneficent Democratic rule.

LATER.—At 5 P. M. in the Second Ward, it was confidently believed that the Democrats were substantially ahead. At that hour 304 white and 111 colored votes had been polled. There are various estimates at this hour, varying from 25 to 60 majority for the Democrats. There are 329 whites registered, and 113 colored votes registered.

How to Prevent Lamp Chimneys Cracking.
A journal, which makes a specialty of matters relating to glass, gives a method which it asserts will prevent chimneys from cracking. The treatment will not only render lamp chimneys, tumbler and like article more durable, but may be applied with advantage to crockery, stoneware, porcelain, etc. The chimneys, tumblers, etc. are put into a pot filled with cold water, to which some common table salt has been added. The water is well boiled over a fire and allowed to cool slowly. When the articles are taken out and washed they will be found to resist afterward any sudden changes of temperature. The process is simply one of annealing, and the slower the cooling part of it is conducted the more effective will be the work.

Memorial Fund.
Mrs. General Preston, of Blacksburg, Virginia, widow of the late Gen. Robert Preston, a brave Confederate officer, has written to General Jas. H. Lane, of our city, the recent gallant commander of Lane's famous North Carolina brigade, of the Army of Northern Virginia, urging that gentleman to assist her in raising a fund in aid of a monument to the many dead Confederate soldiers who lie buried at the Montgomery White Sulphur Springs, one-half or two-thirds of whom—like as on every battle-field upon the sacred soil of old Virginia—are the sons of North Carolina. This place (the Montgomery White Sulphur Springs) was used as a hospital during the recent conflict, and the venerable lady, whose name is mentioned above, was there engaged during the war while her husband was at the front, donating her services to the cause, smoothing many a dying pillow of the boys in gray, whose homes and kindred were far away, and otherwise acting a mother's part to those who had no claim upon her except for humanity's sake, and the cause in which they were all enlisted. This lady, unlike many others in our Southern land, is still mindful of the noble sacrifice made by these dead heroes, and is now devoting the remaining years of her life to rescue the names and deeds of those noble patriots from oblivion. Gen. Lane will receive and forward any subscriptions that may be entrusted to his care. We sincerely trust that this appeal will meet with a generous response from all true North Carolinians who feel themselves able to give to so worthy an object.

To Liquor Dealers.
The attention of LIQUOR DEALERS is called to the following law of the State of North Carolina:
"No person or persons shall give away, in any public place, retail or sell, except upon prescription of a practicing physician, and for medical purposes, any intoxicating liquor at any time within twelve hours next preceding or succeeding any public election or during the holding thereof, at any place within five miles of any election precinct."
"Any person or persons violating the provisions of the preceding section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and punishable with a fine of not less than one hundred nor more than one thousand dollars."
—Battle's Revised, sections 149 and 150.
Notice is hereby given that in accordance with the above law, all Bar Rooms and places where intoxicating liquors are sold, shall be closed at 6 o'clock, P. M., on Wednesday, March 23d, and remain closed until 6 o'clock, A. M., on Friday, March 25th.
Any violation of the above law at the ensuing election, on the 24th of March, 1881, will be vigorously prosecuted.
