A Good Time.
We learn that there was quite a large crowd at the picnic given at Croom's Bridge, in Pender county, on Thursday 21st inst. A magnificent dinner was spread and enjoyed by the large crowd present. In response to repeated calls Dr. Walter Murphy addressed the assemblage and was followed by Judge Bannerman and Dr. Sanders. An excursion down the river late in the afternoon finished the festivities of the day. It is said the party adjourned to meet again on the 4th day of July.

City Court.
For the first time in several days His Honor Mayor Smith held a levee this morning.

The case of a white woman who was arrested on the street on Saturday night for disorderly conduct but who gave bond for her appearance was called. The defendant failed to answer and forfeited her recognizance.

Two butchers, two hucksters and two speculators and shippers of fish were arraigned for refusing to pay the tax. His Honors decision was that they should pay a fine of \$25 each unless the tax was paid within three days.

A Change and its Cause.
There is nothing more beautiful and serene on a mild, spring Sabbath, when the tender green foliage throws a soft and soothing shade over our quiet city, than a lady neatly dressed, wending her way to a place of worship. She walks quietly along with a look of duty well performed and love for mankind settled on her placid face, when suddenly she clutches at her skirts and runs frantically for the nearest gate. The cause of this sudden change is nothing more than a cow, the Aldermen's pet. Why not pass a cattle ordinance? Is the Board of Aldermen afraid to touch the matter?

Emigration to South Carolina.
The train on the W. & W. Railroad, from the North, on Saturday night, last, had one car load of German emigrants, bound to Columbia, S. C. There were thirty-five adults among the number and a good many children. We learn that a large tract of land has been bought in the immediate vicinity of Columbia which is being colonized by Germans, of whom the party above alluded to is but a small portion. They have been passing through for a number of weeks, bound to the same locality, and we understand that there are several more families to follow. The adult portion of those we have seen is composed mainly of young married couples—none over thirty-five, just in the prime and vigor of life, with their children.

A Historic Sword.
Under the above caption the Raleigh *News & Observer* gives the following history of the sword which the Adjutant General of North Carolina will wear at the Yorktown Centennial:
It was worn by his great-grandfather, Major Cadwallader Jones, during the war of the Revolution. He wore it as Major in Baylor's regiment and as aide to General LaFayette at the battle of Brandywine and at the surrender at Yorktown, and in other battles in which he participated. The blade of the sword was presented by General LaFayette. It is a genuine Toledo, and can be bent point to hilt. A tradition exists that this blade is one of a lot of Toledo presented by Charles III, King of Spain, to George Washington, and by him distributed as presents among his general officers. The sword was also worn by General Jones' father, Cadwallader Jones the third of that name in the direct line of descent, as Colonel of the Twelfth South Carolina Regiment in the late war. The Major Cadwallader Jones who served on LaFayette's staff, was the grandson of Peter Jones who founded the city of Petersburg, Va. Another Cadwallader Jones, it is also said, carried the sword in the war of 1812, and yet another in the war with Mexico, 1847-48, so the good blade has a history.

A Dog and Eggs.

Magistrate's Row furnished us with a dog and egg item to-day. A dog, the property of Mr. J. H. Savage, of Federal Point township, was caught by a colored woman in the act of sucking eggs and the woman had the dog shot. She has been arrested for killing the dog and also on a peace warrant. This important case is on trial as we go to press.

Shipped Foreign.
The foreign shipments to-day include 2109 barrels rosin and 500 casks spirit, shipped by Messrs Alex Sprunt & Son, on board the British Brig *J. W. Williams* for Bristol and 137,477 feet lumber by Messrs E. Kidder & Son's, on board Schooner *John Somes* for Hayti.

Missing.
Edmund Lucas, colored, a porter in Messrs West & Co., store has been missing since Saturday night. He left the store at the usual time after providing his family with their weekly stipend of groceries. He did not go home Saturday night and had not been heard of up to 2 o'clock to-day. His wife and family have instituted a search for him. Edmund was generally regular in his habits, and a hard working man, but has been in bad health for some time past. It is feared by his family that he was taken suddenly ill on Saturday night and has since died in some sequestered place.

More Fees for the Marshal and Commissioner.

Messrs Simon Sanders Registrar, S. H. Morton and John L. Dudley inspectors of the general election in the Lower Division of the First Ward held last November, were arrested on Saturday on the affidavit of Joe Carr, colored, who swears that at the election he was challenged as to residence, and tendered a witness to prove his residence when he was told to stand aside and was deprived of his franchise. The registrar and poll holders do not remember of ever having seen Carr until Saturday last. It was proven by Sol W. Nash and Joshua Meares, the two colored poll holders who are not indicted by the "prosecutor," that the registrar and poll-holders did not interfere with or challenge any one offering to vote on that day; that the challenging done during the day was done by the challengers of the political parties and not the poll-holders or registrars. Carr, the prosecutor, looks as though he had been exhumed from the jungles of a cane brake and if he offered to vote, we dare say, he was imported from the country for the purpose. The case is now on trial.

Later.—There being no evidence against Messrs. Sanders, Dudley and Morton they were discharged.

The Planets in Conjunction.

It is only once in an age, or in many ages, that the planets in this solar system arrange themselves in such relation to each other as they hold to-day. Along an imaginary line drawn from the earth to the sun and projected right onward for millions upon millions of miles, the planet Jupiter, beyond that the ringed planet Saturn, and still further out the planet Neptune, are ranged almost as if they were strung together. Between the earth and the sun Venus is swinging into line, and beyond the sun, and between it and Jupiter, little Mercury is also approaching the line of march. But before these two laggards will have joined the celestial dress-parade, the great planets will have already broken ranks to proceed in their circling about the sun. The phenomenon is not of brief duration, like an eclipse or like the transit of the planets Venus or Mercury across the sun's disk. The celestial machinery in this instance is more complicated and ponderous. According to the compilers of the Nautical Almanac, the conjunction, or time of nearest approach of Jupiter and Saturn, occurred on the forenoon of Friday last, but the grand march will not break up until this week.
