The Criminal Court Docket.
The docket of the Criminal Court for the special term commencing the 30th instant is very light indeed and will probably not occupy the time of the Court more than three or four days during the coming week. There is one capital case, however, on docket which has been there for the past year, and is likely to remain there for an indefinite period, or until the defendant, George Myers, colored, indicted for burglary, who escaped from the jail in this county some twelve months or more ago, is recaptured and brought to trial. By the way, we would like to ask what effort has been made to secure the capture of the escaped culprit? His escape, it will be remembered, was a very marvellous one. He was manacled to another prisoner in the same cell and succeeded in freeing himself from the fetters that held him to the floor of the dungeon, without any one, even his companion in chains, being aware of his escape at the time; and then, strange to say, he made his exit through a hole made by removing the bricks from the outer wall of the building, and even the noise of this movement, as the story goes, failed to arouse any one about the building or the premises to the danger of a prisoner escaping. But why should efforts to catch the escaped jail bird cease?

Prohibition at Long Creek.

Notwithstanding the busy time with the farmers just now we understand that the prohibition meeting held at Long Creek yesterday was largely attended. The speaking, it is said, was very good, the dinner a prime one and the dancing in the evening, to the young folks, was "awfully delicious." We are indebted to Mr. Jas. H. Moore, the Secretary of the meeting, for the following report of the day's proceedings:
LONG CREEK, Pender County, May 25th, 1881.

EDITOR REVIEW:
The cause of Prohibition gained much strength here to-day. It was the occasion of a public meeting of the Pender Prohibition Association, in the form of a picnic. The crowd was large. The meeting was a success in point of numbers and in influence produced for prohibition.
The President, Dr. Satchwell, in a hearty greeting and warm welcome to all, said he was glad of this opportunity of again taking the bold and unselfish stand which he had taken for prohibition last fall at its earliest agitation in this State. It might be defeated in Pender and in the State, but on this and all public questions, the ruling motion with him was the enquiry: Is it right, and just and is it best for North Carolina?

After a warm prayer by Rev. J. S. Black, Judge Cantwell was handsomely introduced by the President. He held the large and appreciative audience spell bound for over an hour, in a telling and effective advocacy of the cause of prohibition. He set forth in a lucid and eloquent manner the principles and objects of the movement. His speech produced a strong and happy effect.

The crowd then adjourned, upon invitation, to the long table loaded with the best eatables which the ladies of Pender, combined with some of Wilmington's fair daughters, (who had come with their approving smiles) had prepared, in the shape of a dinner. After this rich and bountiful repast, the social enjoyments of the day were continued by an elegant ball in the lower hall of the Masonic building. This is going on while I write, and promises to be in every way enjoyable. A fine band of music from your city enlivens the exercises of the day and adds to its pleasures.

Preliminary steps were taken for a Grand Prohibition Fourth of July celebration at Burgaw, on the approaching National Anniversary. The Committee of Arrangement consists of Messrs. R. P. Paddison, G. F. Walker, Bruce Williams, S. S. Satchwell, William Hand and W. T. Ennett. The committee were requested to invite Governor Jarvis, Judge Cantwell, Judge Merrimon and others to attend and deliver addresses. A resolution was adopted asking the County Commissioners of Pender to decline to grant license to sell intoxicating drinks.

The ladies of Pender, who are here in large numbers, are strong for prohibition.

R. were about to become the controllers of the Carolina Central. We forbore to publish this at the time, for one reason, we didn't believe it, and the facts justified our forbearance. There is probably no more truth in this last report than there was in the other.

A New Yacht.

A very handsome new yacht arrived in this city on the last New York steamer and is owned by two of our modest young men who will use her only (?) as a pleasure boat to take the place of the yacht *Little Sister*, which has done good service for many years past. The *Glide*, for that is the name of the new yacht, is a perfect beauty and is possibly the best fitted up craft in the fleet of the Carolina Yacht Club. It is thought now that if the small yachts of the Club are entered for the Fourth of July race the *Glide*, of Wrightsville, will be put in. An old boatman says she is evidently a very swift, smart boat.
