City Court.

Rayner Pearsall and Mary Kenan, two evil-disposed colored women of bad character, were arrested in the lower part of the city late Saturday night or early Sunday morning for riotous conduct and conveyed to the Gaard House. This morning they were arraigned upon the charge of an affray. Both defendants bore evidence of the encounter, as both of them had scalp wounds upon their craniums where the wool did grow. One alleged that the other had inflicted a wound upon her in Paddy's Hollow and that she took her revenge by returning the blow when they reached their habitation, in the southern part of the city. A good-sized rock was exhibited in court as the weapon used in one instance by one of the belligerents. His Honor Mayor Smith prescribed for such conduct a fine of \$2.50 in each case—or the alternative of five days' imprisonment in the C. P. In each case the alternative was accepted, and the two went below.

One case of D. and D., that of an old darkey, James West by name, was dismissed and defendant discharged. This finished the business and the Court adjourned.

Decoration Day.

As we write the Memorial services over the graves of the Federal dead are in progress at the National Cemetery, at the Eastern extremity of Market street. It was not intended to have a regular procession but yet there was quite a respectable show in that line by those who fell in on lower Market street, and followed the band who with slow and solemn music marched out to the grounds. The services began, we judge, about half-past 4 o'clock and were not concluded as we close this issue for the press. There were no marshals but the services were under the direction of Mr. W. P. Canaday. According to the programme as published the music was furnished by the choir of St. Stephen's A. M. E. Church, the prayer delivered by Rev. A. M. Conway, and the address by Mr. H. E. Scott. After the address, came music and then the decoration of the graves. During the progress of the services minute-guns were fired from the revenue cutter Colfax which lay abreast of Market dock with her flags all flying, but with her own colors at half-mast. The flags on all the Federal buildings were also at half-mast.
