Copious Rains Yesterday.
There were copious showers of rain yesterday in Brunswick county which probably extended as far as Columbus and perhaps Robeson counties, and the indications this afternoon pointed to more rain in that direction. We understand also that there were good showers in Pender county, East of the railroad. We got none of it here although it is needed sorely.

Robbing the Mails.
Geo. W. Blaney, and Sam Konegay, both colored, were arrested to-day and lodged in jail charged with robbing the U. S. mails. The former has been employed as a messenger at the W. W. and W. C. & A. offices in this city and among his other duties was that of getting the mail from the Postoffice. We have some of the particulars but are obliged to defer the publication of them until to-morrow. Blaney and Konegay were both jailed and will be examined before U. S. Commissioner McQuigg to-morrow morning.

A Span of Trouble.
J. P. Spann, the colored individual who caused the arrest of Simon Gregg, an escaped convict from the South Carolina penitentiary, is again in trouble. It seems as though Spann has for some time past been reaping a good harvest from the "unsuspecting," by practicing what is known in law as false pretense. This morning he was arrested on a warrant sworn out by Mr. W. McEvans who states that Spann had gotten money from him for footing a pair of boots and that the legs which Spann represented as his was the property of another. He was committed in default of bond.

Chicken Dispute and Horse Race.
Active preparations are being made for a chicken dispute, to take place in this city, commencing Tuesday, June 14, and to last three days. The main will be between Wilmington and Charlotte. There will be about fifty birds to the side, and much fun is expected by those who love the sport. On Wednesday, the 15th, a trotting race will be had on Capt. Southerland's new track, at his model farm, near this city. Some of the "boys" from Atlanta, Augusta, Charleston and Richmond are expected to be here, and will enliven the occasion by their presence. The "boys" expect to have a gala week and are looking forward with much pleasure to the sport.

An Annual Occurrence.
Every year about this time one reads in the columns of all the leading newspapers throughout the country a stunning announcement that over half a million of dollars will be given away to some persons who shall send \$10, \$5, \$2, or \$1 to M. A. Dauphin, No. 212 Broadway, New York City, N. Y., or some person at New Orleans, La., for a whole or fractional part of a ticket in the Grand Semi-Annual Distribution, to be made on June 14th, at New Orleans, La., by the Louisiana State Lottery, under the exclusive management of Generals G. T. Beauregard of La., and Jubal A. Early of Va. The management pays the Charity Hospital at New Orleans, La., over a million of dollars for the privilege.

Quite a large number of persons embraced the opportunity of a day's sport at the blackfish grounds to-day. The *Passport* left at 4-30 o'clock this morning, and as the wind is from the right quarter, we are confident the fishermen are having a nice time.

Some Cotton Figures.

The receipts of cotton this Spring have been exceptional. For the eight days ending with to-day they foot up \$67 bales, as against 127 bales for the corresponding eight days of last year. For the month which closes to-day the receipts are 1,888 bales, as against 605 bales in May, 1880. They are as much to-day, lacking but three bales, as during the last eight days of the month last year and it will be noted that the receipts last week were nearly one-half of those for this entire month.

"One Year Ago and Now."
Last year, on May 31st, spirits turpentine was quoted at 24 cents, rosin at \$1.05 for strained and \$1.10 for good strained, tar at \$1.25 and crude turpentine at \$1.50 for hard and \$2.50 for soft and virgin. To-day spirits is quoted at 34 cents, rosin at \$1.55 for strained and \$1.60 for good strained, tar at \$1.90 and crude at \$1.25 for hard, \$2.25 for soft and \$2.50 for virgin. The difference is worth noting.

We are not quite so fortunate, however, in cotton as in naval stores. It is but 10½ to-day for middling against 11 cents a year ago.

The Three Bears and Golden Hair.
The old familiar story of "Little Golden Hair and the Three Bears" forms the ground-work for the beautiful operetta which was performed at the Opera House last evening under the auspices of Professor Chase. The author has, by the introduction of several original characters, lengthened the story sufficiently to form five scenes, all of which he has set to music, and produced the most attractive and popular juvenile operetta in the English language. The characters were well rendered by the charming ladies who so kindly assisted Professor Chase.

The Woodland Queen was presented and sung by Miss Fannie R. Williams. Her melodious soprano won her audience from the start and called forth frequent spontaneous applause. She was regally attired and bore herself with that womanly, charming grace which is delightful to see. It is difficult to believe that Miss Williams made her first appearance on the stage last evening, so great was her success, but yet such is the case.

Miss Mary Lilly Kenan, as *Golden Hair*, was charming, and her acting and singing was perfect. This little lady surprised her friends, and well might they have been. The Misses Empie, as *Faithful* and *Frailty*, Miss Whitehead as *Airy*, and Miss Jackson, as *Light-foot*, enacted their characters admirably, and their sweet voices added much to the characters impersonated and sung by them. Mr. Welsh and Masters Kahnweiler and Dennie Hutton, of Goldsboro, acted their characters with precision and great credit. Master Hutton is immense and has much of the boric actor in him. Prof. Chase, as the *Bard*, did well, as was expected of him, but his trainging of the children for the chorus and the beautiful march was the greatest encomium which can be paid to his ability.

Mrs. M. P. Taylor and Miss Anna Sprunt rendered the accompaniments on a piano and melodion and gave entire satisfaction to both audience and vocalist alike. The choruses, which were rendered principally by little wee things, were as fine as we have ever listened to and were a source of wonderment to the entire audience. By urgent request Professor Chase will repeat his beautiful Operetta to-night and we would advise all who would like to spend a pleasant evening to visit the Opera House.
