## Arrested on suspicion.

## The Trial of Nick Hunter.

From the *Warsaw Brief Mention* we  
glean the following relative to the trial  
last week, at Kenansville, of Nick Hun-  
ter, Clerk of the Superior Court in Le-  
noir county, charged with burning the  
Clerk's office at Kinston, the trial of the  
case having been removed to Duplin:

The trial of Nick Hunter, Clerk of the  
Superior Court of Lenoir county, charged  
with burning the Clerk's office of that  
county, which had been removed to this  
county, began on Wednesday morning  
and was completed at 10 o'clock P.  
M. Saturday, resulting in a mistrial, the  
jury standing seven for conviction and  
five for acquittal. There were over fifty  
witnesses, and quite a number of others  
from Lenoir present, the case exciting  
widespread interest. There were nine  
members of the bar of council for the  
prosecution and six for the defendant.  
The jury was above the usual average.  
The case was thoroughly contested and  
developed a number of circumstances so  
strong and convincing that seven of the  
jurors were fully satisfied of the defend-  
ant's guilt; five good men, however, (for  
all the members of the jury were good  
men), were not so satisfied, contending,  
we understand, that the motive was not  
sufficiently shown, and so saved the de-  
fendant. The case was removed to Car-  
teret county, and the defendant recog-  
nized in \$1,000 for his appearance at the  
next Superior Court of that county. J.  
L. Stewart, Esq., of Clinton, and Col.  
D. K. McRae, of Wilmington, made  
speeches of great power for the State,  
and the defence was argued with ability  
and power by Capt. Granger, of Golds-  
boro, and J. F. Wooten, Esq., of Kinston.

mail robbers had been committed to jail

trial.

Pender county. Motion granted.  
State vs. O. H. Grant, disorderly con-  
duct. Same as above.  
State vs. James Petteway, forcible  
trespass. Case continued.  
State vs. P. W. Smith and Wm.  
Daniels, larceny. Case now on trial.

## Killed While Coupling Cars.

Capt. D. R. Murchison, President of  
the Carolina Central R. R., received this  
afternoon a telegram from Capt. V. Q.  
Johnson, Superintendent, stating that  
Mr. E. H. Paul, station agent at Red  
Banks, was killed at that place this  
morning while coupling cars. Mr. Paul  
was engaged at the time of his death in  
coupling some timber cars together on a  
side track. There was no engine about  
and the cars were being pushed  
together by Mr. Paul's mill hands when  
his head was caught between two sticks  
of timber and terribly crushed. He died  
in a few minutes after the accident.  
Mr. Paul was, as has been said, the  
Station Agent at Red Banks, and was  
one of the most energetic business men  
in that section of the country. He leaves  
a wife and children to mourn his death.

## A Saving to the Tax Payers.

The bill passed at the last session of  
the General Assembly relative to Cor-  
oners and Coroners' inquests virtually abol-  
ishes the office, except in cases where  
foul play is suspected, and then the Cor-  
oner cannot hold an inquest unless some  
reliable person will make an affidavit to  
the effect that the deceased came to his  
death by violent means. The bill is the  
means of a great saving to the county  
and tax payers. Before the bill was  
passed inquests were held over all per-  
sons who died suddenly, at a cost of from  
\$20 to \$25 to the county, no matter  
what were the circumstances attending  
the death. For instance, if it had not  
been for the enactment of the bill an in-  
quest would be held over the body of the  
unfortunate man, Tom Howard, who  
lost his life yesterday by accidental  
drowning, as every one knows.
