Renovating Feather Beds.

We give below directions for renovating feather beds. This being the proper season for such things, we hope some one may be benefited by it. We copy from an exchange:

Old feather beds and pillows are greatly improved by putting them on a clean grass plat, during a heavy shower; let the beds become thoroughly wetted, turning them on both sides. Let them lie out until thoroughly dry, then beat them with rods; this will lighten the feathers and make them much more healthy to sleep. It removes dust and renovates the feathers.

The University.

We have received, with the compliments of Hon. K. P. Battle, the President, a catalogue of the University of North Carolina, for 1880-81. The catalogue shows a total of 191 students for the past collegiate year, of whom 32 were seniors, 27 juniors, 27 sophomores, 51 freshmen, 43 optional, 14 law and 10 medical, 13 having been counted twice in the class divisions. We notice the names of James D. Murphy, from Pender county, as a fourth year student; E. A. Alderman, Thomas Radcliffe and Charles W. Worth, of this city, third year; David Stone Cowan, of Columbus, second year, and S. J. Chauncey, of Columbus, first year.

We publish elsewhere Rev. C. H. Wiley's report on the University, which will be found of interest.

EDITOR REVIEW:

The Journal of the Secession Convention, published by John W. Syme, Raleigh, 1862, page 3, now before me, shows the members assembled at 11 a. m. on Monday, the 20th May, and immediately entered on business. The ordinance was introduced by Burton Craigie and unanimously adopted same day. The record closes as follows: "And then, at half-past six p. m., the ever-memorable twentieth of May, the Convention adjourned until to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock."

On Tuesday, the 21st May, page 23, "Messrs Badger, Batchelor and Gorrell severally asked and obtained leave to have it recorded on the journal that if they had been present yesterday they would have voted in favor of the ordinance dissolving the Union then subsisting between the State of North Carolina and the other States."
