chandise, arrived here on yesterday.
The *Griffin* is an old trader here and
Capt. Charlie, who has been trading to
this port for the past 33 years, has been
successful, and generally makes quick
time and some of the shortest passages on
record have been made by him in the dif-
ferent vessels he has had command of
trading to this port.

County Commissioners.
The Board of County Commissioners
met in regular monthly session this after-
noon. Present, Chairman Bagg and
Commissioners Moore, Worth, Mont-
gomery and Pierce.

It was ordered by the Board that the
Clerk notify the Supervisors of public
roads in Cape Fear township that the
road leading from Hilton ferry to the
Pender county line, known as the "Nig-
ger Head Road," has been declared a
public road in accordance with law.

The petition of Mr. E. Van Lear was
granted.
The computing of the tax books for
1881 was awarded to Col. J. G. Burr at
\$500.

The Treasurer presented his monthly
report as follows: General fund, show-
ing balance on hand, \$23,956.59; special
fund, showing balance on hand, \$589.89,
and surrendered one coupon of \$3 which
was destroyed by the Board; educational
report, showing balance on hand, \$8,-
792.88.

The Register submitted his monthly
report and exhibited the treasurer's re-
ceipt for \$15.30.
A petition from Rich. H. Lewis, Sec-
retary of the Caswell Memorial Associa-
tion, asking for a donation from this
county, was received and laid upon the
table.

A letter from Mr. H. A. Gudger,
Superintendent of the Deaf and Dumb
Asylum, in reference to a little blind
boy of this county, now in the asylum,
was received.

Mr. Jesse B. Hawes was appointed a
student to the University of North Caro-
lina from this county.
The Board then adjourned.

The Board then resolved themselves
into a Board of Education and adjourned
subject to the call of the Chairman.

Joint Meetings.
The Board of Magistrates and Board
of Education met in joint session this
morning, Justice Jas. S. James presid-
ing, for the purpose of electing a Super-
intendent of Public Instruction.

Messrs A. R. Black and Iredell John-
son were put in nomination.
Cels. John L. Cantwell and Roger
Moore were appointed tellers.

A ballot was had and Mr. Johnson
was declared elected, he having received
a majority of the votes cast.
The meeting then adjourned.

Upon the adjournment of the joint
meeting of the Board of Education and
Board of Magistrates a joint meeting of
the Board of County Commissioners and
the Board of Magistrates was held, Jus-
tice John S. James presiding. Chair-
man Bagg, of the Board of Commis-
sioners, explained the object of the meeting,
which was the settlement of a line be-
tween the lands of the county near Lit-
tle Bridge and those of Mr. Jno. F.
Garrell. The decision of the Board of
County Commissioners relative to the
said line was endorsed.

The County Commissioners were au-
thorized to put a tin roof on the Poor
House, and were also authorized to
build a wing, at an expense not to ex-
ceed \$2,500, on the east side of the Court
House building, and to have a fire-proof
vault built in the wing, in which will be
kept the records of the county.

Mr. H. A. Bagg, Chairman of the
Board of Commissioners, stated that the
Board had been for some time looking
forward to the improvement of the Poor
House and the building of the wing to
the Court House, and that those im-
provements could now be made without
one cent additional cost to the tax-pay-
ers. The meeting then adjourned.

THE MEDICAL MEN.

**The Doctors in Council at Asheville—
A Full and Harmonious Session.**
(Reported for the DAILY REVIEW.)
ASHEVILLE, N. C., Friday, June 3.
EDITOR REVIEW:—You have already
heard of the assemblage of the North
Carolina Medical Society here. Now
that its session has extended during
three days it is plainly evident that this
has been a valuable meeting. Notwith-
standing that the meeting was at a point
so remote from the thicker settled coun-
ties, the Eastern representation was
strong, and the Western members of the
profession came in in good numbers.
Since the war, the Society has not met
so far West, principally because there
was no Western physician prominent as
a member, and the railroad had not been
finished. It was a lucky stroke of policy
as well as a matter of justice to the
West, that the physicians of that section
should be allowed an opportunity, at the
least expense to them, of procuring the
license of the Board of Examiners, and
of taking their proper stand with the
profession of the State. It cannot be
overlooked either that the Society need-
ed the establishment of fraternal rela-
tions with the West, and thereby ally
themselves with the many men of ability
who are toilers in the common cause.

At this meeting there were at least
forty applicants for the license of the
Board. Eminent among them was
the venerable and scholarly former
editor of the *Charleston Medical
Journal and Review*, and mem-
ber of the faculty of the Charleston
Medical College. He had taken this
first opportunity of uniting with the
State Medical Society, yielding grace-
fully to a law of the State of his adop-
tion, although he was a graduate and
practitioner before at least four of the
examiners were born. This may be
taken as an indication of the moral in-
fluence which surrounds the law, for other
eminent men and sons of eminent leaders
in the profession are on the list of recent
licentiates.

Every member of the Board was present,
and the arduous and delicate work
was conducted continuously, until all the
candidates were examined. Of late years
the Society has adopted the plan of ap-
pointing a reporter in all the seven
branches of medicine. The reporter,
aided by members interested in his
branch, reviews the progress of surgery,
anatomy or practice of medicine, as the
case may be, and reads the result of his
labors before the Society. This has
proven a valuable method. This year
Dr. A. Holmes of Clinton, though ab-
sent, sent in his report through another
member. His paper was most carefully
digested, covering all the ground of an-
tiseptic surgery and other important
questions. The paper was very long but
was received with marked interest.

Dr. J. Wellington Faison, formerly of
Duplin county, but now a resident of
Davie county, gave a well-digested re-
sume of the practice of medicine. Dr.
Faison is one of the young members of
the Society, but his active course has
so far shown that he is destined to take
a high stand, in indeed this paper of his
does not on quiet perusal actually place
him in a prominent position.

Dr. Hubert Haywood is still younger
in the Society, and the task assigned him
was the most difficult of all, the report
on the progress of Microscopy and Pa-
thology. The most difficult because
it takes special training and special
knowledge to keep pace with the rapidly
growing department. A perusal of his
paper will show him to be a most ex-
cellent student.

Dr. Walter C. Murphy, Chairman of
the section on Therapeutics and Materia
Medica, devoted most of his attention to
the properties of the numerous medi-
cines that have been introduced of late
years. It was not expected that a pa-
per of this sort could escape severe crit-
icism, but its delivery certainly spoke
well for the industry and boldness of the
reporter.

It will be seen that these last reporters
named were all young men, and it speaks
well for the *esprit du corps* of this med-
ical body, that a young member is so
cordially applauded for his work, and is
so universally encouraged as to aim at
the highest positions.

Robbery.
The store of Messrs. Wescott & Bro.
at the rock quarry, near the Northeast
river, in Pender county, was broken
open on Sunday and robbed of money
and checks to the amount of \$75. There
is no clue to the rascals.

From Fayetteville.
The excursion of Cumberland Lodge
of Knights of Pythias, of Fayetteville,
from that city to the seashore, will take
place on the Tuesday of next week, the
14th inst. The steamer *North State*
will bring the excursionists to the city
but we do not know as yet what ar-
rangements have been made for taking
them down the river.

There was but one bale of cotton re-
ceived at this port to-day. Contrast
