**THE ECLIPSE OF THE MOON.**  
 The total eclipse of the moon, of which we have heretofore informed our readers, will take place early to-morrow morning. If the weather is good and the atmosphere clear it will be a sight well worth the sacrifice of a little sleep. The moon will be full at 43 minutes past 1 o'clock. The eclipse begins—that is, the dark shadow enters upon the moon—at 26 minutes after midnight. The total phase commences at 1 hour 29 minutes, and ends at 2 hours 51 minutes. The eclipse ends at 3 hours 52 minutes.

**A Poor Miserable Object.**  
 Health Officer Scharff, while perambulating his beat this morning, came across a poor unfortunate colored man, by the name of John Adams, reeking in filth and loathsome with disease, whom he reported to the city physician. The wretched object of humanity was seated in a flat at the foot of Mulberry street this morning where he remained until the Superintendent of Health in the goodness of his heart had him removed to the County Poor House. The individual named above is from Wilson, on the W. & W. R. R., and has been engaged in working here on lighters until disabled by the steady encroachment of the fearful malady from which he is suffering.  
**A Narrow Escape.**  
 A young man who was rather bibulosity inclined, while handling his pistol rather carelessly in a saloon on Market street, this morning, was surprised by an explosion in one of the chambers, the powder from which burnt his hands and blackened his white breeches, while the ball went through his pants near the knee—luckily, however, for the owner of the weapon without touching his flesh—and sped on through a spoke in the back of a chair, carrying half of it away and finally burying itself in the wall in rear of the saloon, some ten yards distant. A young man who two seconds before the discharge of the pistol was seated in the chair opposite, had scarcely moved his seat when the accident happened. Who says there is not an angel of good guarding the movements of some white yet on earth? The chair in which the young man had been seated was, as stated above, partly carried away, and the course of the ball was in a direct line with where the young man's breast would have been.  
**Caught at Last.**  
 A white man by the name of Alfred Thompson, who hails from Columbus county, was arrested here last night, between 9 and 10 o'clock, under a capias issued from the Superior Court of Columbus county. It seems that some four or five months ago warrants were issued in Columbus for Thompson's arrest, on the charge of several larcenies committed in that county, but the man got wind of them and escaped and came to this city. The Sheriff of Columbus thereupon conferred with the police authorities in this city when it was ascertained that Thompson was here, Policeman Costin stating that he knew the man and that he was then at work at the Gas Works. A capias was then forwarded to Sheriff Manning, who entrusted the arrest to a colored deputy, who fired and missed his bird. He called at the Gas Works for Thompson (who had changed his name), and Superintendent Reilly stated that there was no one on his pay-roll answering to that name. The officer left and Thompson got wind of the affair and skipped the town. He was last heard from as having been in the employ of a Mr. Williamson, a miller, at Florence, from whom he stole \$300 in gold. It seems that he then made a hurried trip to Wilmington to visit his wife and family, whom he had left here, was then traced to Columbia, S. C., thence to New York, and thence to Charleston, whence, on the supposition that he would next appear in this city, a strict lookout was kept for him. He did arrive here last Tuesday night, and last night Sergeant Davis, of the police force, with Officers Green, Kendrick, Williams and Weebse made a descent upon his house and effected his capture. The building was surrounded, but Thompson made several desperate attempts to escape by the windows when, finding that it was useless, he quietly surrendered. He is now in jail to await the arrival of the officers from Columbus.
