City Matters.

A meeting of the Board of Audit and Finance and the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen was held at the City Hall last night, when the following mattters were considered and acted

In the matter of leasing the Opera House, the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen recommended that it be leased to Mr. E. J. Pennypacker for the five years from October next, according to specification, and at the annual rental of \$600, payable quarterly, and was concurred in by the Board of Audit and Finance.

In the matter of a petition from Mr. W. L. DeRosset, Jr., concerning the tax on job printing officers, the tax ordinance was amended as follows: "Where not more than two type-setters are employed, one dollar per month; in excess of two, three dollars per month."

In the matter of the police force, asking increase of pay, the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen recommended that the pay be not increased but that the force be furnished with a uniform (summer); provided, that if a city for three months after the uniform is furnished, it shall be returned to the city. On motion, the recommendation was concurred in by the Board of Audit and Finance.

The levy of a tax of five dollars per month on boss stevederes who make contracts for work, recommended by the Board of Aldermen, was concurred in by the Board of Audit and Finance.

In the matter of the new market house. (the company asking for a committee of conference from the two boards to meet a committee from the Wilmington Market Company), the chair appointed Mr. Jones and Mr. Calder, and on motion. the chairman of the Board of Audit and Finance was added.
