Superior Court.
Several civil suits were disposed of this morning, the most important of which was Nicholas Carr versus Cronly & Morris. This was a case in which Mr. Carr, as Constable acting for other parties, sued Messrs. C. & M. who, simply as agents for another party, had money in their possession, which plaintiff tried according to law to obtain possession of. The plaintiff, we learn, however, was non-suited and Messrs. Cronly & Morris will therefore be allowed to pay the money over to their patron.

In the case of M. P. Taylor versus the Bell Telephone Company, alluded to in our issue of yesterday as having been given to the jury, a verdict was returned in favor of the plaintiff for \$5,900. The five thousand dollars was awarded, we hear, as damages for the libel by the published card of Mr. Ormes the General Southern, Agent and the nine hundred dollars additional for the six months services which plaintiff claimed he was entitled to, as we understand it, as per contract. The counsel for defendant have made a motion for a new trial which His Honor will hear on Saturday.
