Elementary Grammar.

From Mr. John B. Piet, of Baltimore, the publisher, we have received a copy of "An Elementary Grammar of the English Language," by Henry E. Shepherd, M. A., Superintendent of Public Instruction at Baltimore. Prof. Shepherd is a North Carolinian, a native of Fayetteville, and son of the late Judge Shepherd, and he is known as one of the most accomplished educators of the age. His name as the author of this book should be sufficient of itself to guarantee its excellence. Professor Shepherd is one of the principal contributors to the "American Journal of Philology," edited by Professor Gildersleeve, and also one of the contributors to the "Dictionary of the English Language" now in preparation under the auspices of the London Philological Society. As in the case of his "History of the English Language," a work endorsed by the ablest professors in the country, the author of his new Elementary Grammar shows the most familiar acquaintance with his subject. Superior Court.

The most notable case disposed of by the Court to-day was that of M. P. Taylor versus J. M. Ormes, for libel in publishing a card in the daily papers of the city, reflecting (or rather with a tendency in that direction) upon the plaintiff's standing and character. The counsel for plaintiff asked for judgment by default, Mr. Ormes, the defendant, having failed to appear or put in an answer to the writ. The amount of damages claimed; by plaintiff in this case is \$10,000, but the judgment of the Court in this instance does not affect the amount claimed that is a matter as we learn to be determined by a jury. The counsel took an appeal from the Court's ruling in this matter, to the Supreme Court. His Honor then listened to argument by counsel of the Bell Telephone Company who are defendants in a previous case, already reported by us, in which a verdict of \$5,000 damages and \$900 for violation of contract was awarded by the jury to the plaintiff. The motion entered by defendant's counsel for a new suit was not allowed but Judge Graves stated that if the defendant would not agree to accept \$500 instead of \$900, for violation of contract, he would set aside the verdict and that he considered the award of \$5,000 damages as excessive.

The counsel for the plaintiff agreed to the proposition of \$500 and the verdict remains as amended by the Court, \$500 for violation of contract and \$5,000 damages for the libel. The counsel for defendant appealed from the ruling of the Court in refusing to grant their motion for a new trial.

The Finance Committee met immediately after the adjournment of the Board and opened the bids for the construction of the addition to the Court House and tinning the roof of the Poor House. Messrs B. D. Morrill & Son were awarded the contract for the former and Messrs Parker & Taylor for the latter job.
