second class. There will be two club
prizes of equal value sailed for, one as a
prize for the winning boat in the
first class and the other for the
leading craft in the second class. These
prizes will be given in addition to the
Champion Flag and in order to in-
fuse more interest and competition in the
race one of our most enterprising dry
good merchants has offered a sufficient
quantity of blue flannel to uniform the
crew of the winning yacht. The tide
will be high at 3 o'clock and the pros-
pects are that the entire race can be sail-
ed on the top of the tide with a smashing
breeze.
