The Annual Regatta of the Carolina Yacht Club.

The Annual Regatta of the Carolina Yacht Club, on the Fourth, over the Wrightsville Course, will no doubt draw a large crowd to the beach on that day. Besides the Champion Flag of the Club, a Club Prize will be given to each of the winning yachts in the First and Second class. The yachts are to be divided into two classes. Those over 16 feet 9 inches will be in the first, while those under will be in the second class, though the owners of crafts under 16 feet 9 inches can enter them in the first class if they so desire.

It will be seen that the *Glide* and *Restless* are both placed in the First class, though they are under 16 feet 9 inches. The list may be a little incorrect, as we were forced to gather our information piece-meal, but we think, upon the whole, it is substantially correct. If there is any mistake made, it is in the list of names of the Captains of the yachts. In addition to the Club prizes, a sufficient quantity of blue flannel for uniforms for the crew of the winning yacht will be awarded by one of our most enterprising dry goods merchants. The race will be started at 2 o'clock and sailed on a rising and high tide.

The New Sharpie.

Roger Moore is the name of the new sharpie, which was built in this city for Mr. Henry H. Heide. She is 25 feet long, 8 feet beam, and has easy seating capacity for forty persons, though a much larger number could be carried in her. She is rigged with two large leg-of-mutton sails and carries in all 145 yards of canvas. She is very "stiff," as all sharpies are, and is said to be very fast. When loaded with forty grown persons, she draws eight inches of water. She was built for use on the Sound, and will be in readiness to take visitors to the beach and return on the Fourth. The *Roger Moore* was out on the river yesterday afternoon and was very much admired by those who saw her.

Crop Prospects.

The best field of corn, taking the number of acres planted into consideration, within a radius of fifty miles, is, we are confident, upon the plantation of Dr. E. Porter, about one mile easterly from Rocky Point, in Pender county. The field contains 125 acres, about 100 of which are in corn while the remainder is in cotton and groundpeas. The corn, which is all in one body, will average nearly or quite six feet in height, and is remarkably even in its appearance and growth throughout the entire field. We passed through a large portion of it yesterday, the 30th ult., and, although we had been apprised of its forward condition, we were astonished at such a remarkable growth for the time of year.

The cotton and peas alluded to were also looking very finely, giving promise of an abundant harvest.

An Improvement.

The sharpie *Roger Moore*, under command of Capt. James Brinkley, will be at Wrightsville on the Fourth to take passengers to and from the beach. When fully loaded she draws only eight inches of water and it is hardly possible that she will get stuck on a shoal. In addition to her light draft of water she is said to be very fast and is perfectly tight and dry.

Terrible Rainstorm.

The heaviest rain and thunder storm our city has known for years visited us this afternoon. The storm was unaccompanied by much wind, the maximum velocity being only 16 knots an hour. The streets were washed up and considerably damaged in many places. Market street, from Third to the river, was a sheet of water averaging about twelve inches in depth. Boxes, barrels and chicken coops were swept pell-mell by the torrent and vegetables were floating about the streets and carried madly into the river by the water in the gutters. All the stores on the south side of Market street, between Front and Second, were flooded, and many of the goods were damaged. Messrs. Hart, Bailey & Co's. machine shops were flooded, the water rushing through them about 8 inches deep, though no damage was done other than the suspension of work. The water in the alley was from 20 to 24 inches in depth.

The grocery establishment of Geo. Myers was also flooded, the water being waist-deep in the back room and about ten inches in depth in the main body of the store. Their damage is estimated at about \$200.

It is said to be the heaviest rain fall in twenty years. From the signal office we learn that 4 inches and 20-100 of rain fell in about one hour. During the August cyclone of 1879, when the Atlantic Hotel, at Beaufort, was swept away, there were 8 inches and 90-100 of rainfall in this city on the 17th and 18th. For the short time that the rain fell here to-day the rainfall, about half as much as fell in two days then, is unprecedented in the annals of our history. There has been much damage done but we have not time in this issue to give a full account of it.

This Year and Last Year.

The receipts of cotton at this port during the month of June just closed foot up 1,306 bales, as against 323 bales for the same month last year; spirits, 10,260 casks against 10,411 last June; resin, 32,845 barrels against 29,388; tar, 1,499 barrels against 1,484; and crude turpentine 9,564 barrels against 10,537.

Cotton is quoted to-day at 10 1/2 for middling, against 11 cts last July 1st; spirits at 40 cts to-day against 24 1/2; resin at \$1.75 and \$1.80 against \$1.02 and \$1.07; tar at \$3.15 against \$1.60 and crude turpentine \$2.75 for soft and virgin against \$2.50.

In exports for the month just closed we have a total, foreign and domestic, of 2,187 bales of cotton against 819 last June; 10,277 casks spirits against 12,154; 41,222 barrels resin against 49,762; 4,103 barrels tar against 2,467; and 250 barrels crude against 507.

These figures are all from the books of the Secretary of the Produce Exchange.

School Breaking at Rocky Point.

The closing exercises of the school at Rocky Point, taught by Miss I. Durham, were held at the school room yesterday, the 30th ult. The examination proper took place during the daytime while the evening was devoted to vocal and instrumental music, dialogues, charades and speeches, all of which were rendered in good taste and in a majority of instances excellently. The weather was oppressively hot and the room was crowded and almost to suffocation by the ladies and gentlemen of the vicinity, but the young lads and lassies composing the school, un mindful of the former and cheered by the inspiring presence of the latter, went through the several parts assigned them with promptness, ease and infinite grace. We wish that we had space to particularize, but where all were deserving it becomes unnecessary. Miss Durham is a faithful and efficient teacher—easy and polished in manners—firm yet kind in discipline, with a fondness and perfect adaptability for her profession which makes her services invaluable as a teacher. She is a thorough musician and that portion of the entertainment reflected great credit both upon teacher and pupils. We regretted exceedingly that previous arrangements prevented our remaining until the entertainment closed, and when we were compelled reluctantly to decline the many invitations to remain and the hearty proffers of hospitality from the citizens of the neighborhood, we felt that we had been altogether too previous in our arrangements.
