Fire in a Lime House.

Last evening about 7 o'clock volumes of smoke were discovered pouring out of the ventilation windows in a large brick warehouse, in the rear of Messrs Chess, Carley & Co's. office, used by Messrs E. G. Barker & Co. as a lime house. The fire was doubtlessly caused by the leaking of the roof during the heavy rains in the afternoon. The fire department was soon on the spot and throwing three streams of water on the lime, which increased the fire. The fire is no nearer extinguished now than it was last night but more lime has been slacked. The building will be almost a total wreck. The walls are now badly cracked and have been shoved out of plumb from 6 to 8 inches by the lime. It is owned by Mr. McW. B. Noyes, now Consul at Venice, who is represented here by Mr. A. Martin. There is an insurance of \$500 on the building in a company represented in Mr. Sam'l Northrop's agency. There were 1,600 barrels of lime in the building when the fire was discovered, all of which will be a total loss. Messrs. E. G. Barker & Co. are fully protected by insurance. The engines are still playing on the lime and unless they can manage to drown it out pretty soon some of the boys may spend the Fourth in slacking lime.

HEADQUARTERS SECOND BRIGADE,
NORTH CAROLINA STATE GUARD,
WILMINGTON, N. C.,
JUNE 27, 1881.

General Orders: No. 21.
In view of the approaching Celebration of Yorktown Centennial, in October next, the General Commanding the Second and Third Military Districts takes this method of urging the Commandants of Companies to drill their respective commands as often as possible.

It is the earnest desire of His Excellency the Governor and of the Adjutant General of the State that the N. C. S. Guard shall be second to none, in point of drill and equipment, at Yorktown.

A DEVILISH DEED.

President Garfield Shot and Mortally Wounded—Intense Excitement at the Capital—Arrest of the Assassin—"I am a Stalwart"—The President Dying.

About half-past 10 o'clock this forenoon the startling information was received here that President Garfield had been shot by an assassin. The news was credited by but few until confirmed by later dispatches and then the entire community blazed with excitement. It was long before any decided details could be had and in the meantime denunciations of the dastardly deed from all, Democrats and Republicans, whites and blacks alike, were heard on every side. At this writing, 4 P. M., it is the cordial and sincere wish of our people that the President's life may not be in danger, that he may soon be thoroughly recovered, and that the hand of the law may severely punish the man who may dare to lay violent hands on the head of this Republic, the chief representative of the American people.

Such particulars as have been received are to the effect that the President was at the Baltimore & Potomac depot, this morning, at 9:30 o'clock, waiting to take the train for New England. He was walking arm-in-arm with Mr. Blaine, when a man by the name of Charles Guiteau, of Chicago, an ex-Consul at Marseilles, appeared and fired twice in succession and rapidly. The President fell to the floor and the assassin was arrested. Both shots took effect, one in the right arm and the other in the hip. The President was removed, as soon as possible, to the White House and five physicians were soon at his bedside. At first the prostration from the effects of the shot was very great and the reaction was slow, but it was intended to probe for the balls this afternoon.

Guiteau has announced himself to be a stalwart. He has been persistent of late in his application for a consulship but could not obtain it and this is thought to have been the basis of the motive for the dastardly and cowardly deed.

LATER—THE PRESIDENT DYING.

The latest information we have is contained in a special to this paper from Washington City, dated 4:25 p. m., which states that President Garfield is dying the bullet having penetrated his spine. The assassin, when arrested, exclaimed: "It is all right. I am a Stalwart. Arthur is President now. I have a letter to General Sherman; take me to him, and I'll explain everything."
