## Habeas Corpus Case.

The result of the investigation before Judge Meares yesterday at Chambers, in the matter of argument by counsel for a writ of *habeas corpus* in the case of John McKoy, colored, resulted in the petition being granted and the defendant admitted to bail by His Honor in the sum of \$600, the bond to be approved by the Judge. This morning Mr. W. P. Oldham and Dr. John H. Freeman together became sureties on McKoy's bond for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court when the case will be tried by jury before Judge Meares.

## Off for Europe.

Rev. L. S. Burkhead, D. D., Presiding Elder of the Wilmington District of the M. E. Church, South, left the city this morning on the northern bound train for his home in Raleigh, and from thence will go to New York, whence he sails by ocean steamer, on the 6th of August, for Europe, to attend the gathering of delegates of the M. E. Church, from all parts of the globe, in one Ecumenical Council, to be held in the city of London, commencing on or about the 1st day of September. Dr. Burkhead has been preceded by Col. Walter Clark, of Raleigh, a lay delegate, who sailed from New York some three or four weeks ago, and who we understand will make a short tour of the Continent before the Council convenes and deliver a series of lectures.

The North Carolina Conference sends but two delegates—those mentioned above—but they have sent two able representatives.

## Looking This Way.

The following, which we clip from the *Lenoir Topic*, will be read with interest. We most sincerely trust that this road will yet reach Wilmington, despite the opposition with which Gen. Imboden's plans has been met. We believe that it is the desire of the Company whom Gen. Imboden represents to reach this point and that they will yet come here. The following is the extract alluded to:

Lenoir will, in the course of time, when all of the projected railroads are finished, be one of the most important railroad centres in Western North Carolina. The Chester road, the Yadkin Valley road and the Tinsalia road all tend this way, and now there is another line projected from this point in another direction. The Salisbury Watchman has been interviewing Capt. Wm. Cain, late on the Imboden survey, but now employed on the Midland route, and he says that Gen. Imboden is very much in favor of extending the Tinsalia road from Lenoir via Taylorsville, Salisbury and Wadesboro to Wilmington, and that, very probably, a survey of that route will soon be begun.

Emerson, Assistant Freight and Ticket Agent of the Atlantic Coast Line, in this city, has resigned that position for the purpose of accepting a similar office, with increased pay, on the Chesapeake & Ohio R. R. The resignation is to take effect on the first of August but his successor has not yet been announced. We are sorry that we are to lose Mr. Emerson. He is an exceedingly clever gentleman, a good citizen and an excellent officer and, besides, a Wilmingtonian "by marriage." But our loss is his gain and we can only wish him as many friends in his new field of labor as he leaves behind him here.

Before Justice Millis this morning, Mary Giles, colored, was arraigned for wilful trespass upon the affidavit of Elias Duffy, colored. The case was tried and dismissed at the cost of the prosecutor. The defendant in the foregoing case then became prosecutor and had Elias Duffy arrested under a peace warrant and the defendant, Elias Duffy, was required to pay the costs in this case also, and to furnish a bond of \$50 to keep the peace for ninety days.
