A Simple Vermin Exterminator.
Many of our people are greatly troubled by rats and mice about their premises. The following simple recipe for getting rid of them, and at the same time using a good disinfectant about the house, is highly recommended by an exchange: "We clear our premises of this detestable vermin by making whitewash yellow with copperas, and covering the stones and rafters in the cellar with a thick coat of it. In every crevice where a rat might tread we put the crystals of the copperas, and scattered the same in the corners of the floor. The result was a perfect stampede of rats and mice. Since that time not a squeak of either rats or mice has been heard about the house. Every spring a coat of the same yellow wash is given to the cellar as a purifier, as well as a rat exterminator, and no typhoid dysentery, or fever attacks the family."

Capt. Jos. Price, Harbor Master at this port, reports as follows for the month of July, just closed:

The Prohibition Speeches.

Notwithstanding the inclement weather there was a large turnout last night in front of the Opera House to hear the addresses on Prohibition promised from Hon. D. L. Russell and Maj. James C. McRae. The speakers were presented to the audience by Capt. N. F. Thompson.

Maj. McRae, the President of the State Prohibition Convention, was the first to speak. His address, as also Judge Russell's, are said by many who have followed the campaign, to have been the most admirable they have yet heard on the subject, and in support of the Prohibition bill. It was noticed that there were a large number of colored people in the audience, and it was to those that Judge Russell addressed the latter part of his remarks.

As soon as the two regular addresses had been delivered, Mr. R. S. Waller, a Greenbacker of local celebrity, was called to the stand by some of those present, and he responded in a short, but very good address.

Board of Audit and Finance.

At a meeting of the Board of Audit and Finance, held yesterday afternoon, Mr. Norwood Giles moved, and it was carried, that the action of the Board of Aldermen relative to the establishment of a hospital be approved, and that the yearly expenditure on the part of the city for the maintenance of said hospital shall not exceed \$1,000.

Mr. Giles explained his motion by presenting an estimate made Drs. Lane and Wood for yearly expenditure, showing a sum of \$1,886 as ample for the average care of twelve patients throughout the year, as follows:

Twelve patients, at 30 cts. per day, \$3.60	\$1,314
Cooking and washing, \$10 per month	120
Steward and nurse	120
Medicine	50
Superintendent	300
	\$1,904

This amount, they say, will be considerably lessened by pay patients.

It should be understood that, in accordance with law, the city is to pay two-fifths, or \$761.60 as estimated above, for the maintenance of the hospital, and the county three-fifths, or \$1,142.40, so it will be seen that the appropriation of \$1,000 will be amply sufficient to cover all estimated expenses and allow a fair margin for unforeseen emergencies, should any arise.
