## The Crops.

A journey along the line of the Carolina Central, as far as Hamlet, and thence on the Raleigh & Augusta Air Line to Monrovia, about 30 miles West of Raleigh, gave us some idea of the condition of the crops. Between this city and Laurinburg, a week ago, there was not a yellow blade of grass or the withered leaf of a tree or a shrub to be seen. Everything was as beautiful and as verdantly green as can be found anywhere in the month of June. The crops then looked superb and promised an abundant yield, but this promise, we noticed yesterday on our return over the same ground, will depend upon full seasons; rain is being need, a fact that is evidenced by a glance at the fields of corn and cotton. Above Laurinburg, and along the line of the Air Line road, and as far into the interior of Chatham county as Pittsboro, the effects of the drouth are being severely felt. The gardens are parched and the growing corn and cotton are stunted, the former promising to yield scarcely the fourth of a crop. It is true that there were rains last Sunday, but there was not enough of water to be of a practical benefit. Ten inches of rainfall, in twenty-four hours, would hardly be too much in some localities.

## North Carolina Pharmaceutical Association.

NEWBERN, N. C., August 10, 1881.  
The second annual meeting of the North Carolina Pharmaceutical Association convened in this city yesterday morning, and was called to order by the President, E. M. Nadal, at 10 o'clock, in the Masonic Hall.

The association was welcomed in behalf of the druggists of Newbern by Mr. E. M. Meadows. Dr. W. H. Green, of Wilmington, responded for the visiting druggists, and then J. S. Long, Esq., of Newbern, made a beautiful address, welcoming the druggists in behalf of the authorities, which was responded to by the president, Mr. Nadal.

The convention was opened with prayer by Rev. Mr. Vass, of the Presbyterian Church.

On the roll being called about seventy-five delegates were found to be present, representing all sections of the State.

Dr. Bear-Wolfe, a visiting delegate from Maryland College of Pharmacy, presented his credentials and was received.

At 12 o'clock the convention adjourned till 3 p. m.

**AFTERNOON SESSION.**  
The executive committee reported favorably on forty new applications for membership, which were ballotted on and elected members of the association.

The treasurer's report shows a balance on hand of \$462.

Several very interesting papers on pharmacy were read, which reflected credit upon their authors. Dr. Hinsdale, of Fayetteville, interested the association very much by reading a paper on color tests for strychnia, simple process for determining the amount of morphia in opium, &c.

The report of the delegates to the American Pharmaceutical Association, made by Dr. Hinsdale, was read.

An assistant secretary was appointed by the president.

The convention then adjourned till 10 o'clock this morning.

The officers present are: President, E. M. Nadal; vice presidents, Wm. Simpson, E. M. Meadows and S. J. Hinsdale; secretary, T. C. Smith.

Mr. Pescud, the treasurer, we regret to learn, is detained at home by sickness. His report was read by Mr. Lee and referred to the auditing committee, who examined the accounts and found them all correct.
