### Angola Pocosin.

We understand that a number of citizens in the Eastern section of Pender county have determined upon building a road through Angola Pocosin, to run from Croom's Bridge, over the North East river, to Dog Branch, on the Chinquepin road, above White Oak Swamp. It will be seven miles in length and nearly ail of it will be through the Pocosin. The road will be built by private enterprise and when completed will be turned over to the county. It will place the residents of the Northeastern part of the county eight miles nearer to the railroad, at South Washington. The cost will be about \$1,500, to be borne by private subscription, and it is thought that the road will be open this Fall.

#### St. Stephen s A. M E Church.

There are no greater educators of the public mind and taste than handsome buildings and it always gives us pleasure to chronicle the erection of them. A day or two ago we were shown through corner of Fifth and Red Cross streets, presided over by the Rev. J. G. Frye, and must confess to some surprise as to its immense dimensions and staunch and substantial walls and timbers The church, which is of the pure Gothic style of architecture, is exactly like St John's Episcopal Church, butagreat deal larger. It is 90x57 feet and the main auditorium is 48 feet 6 inches high in the clear. is supplied with a basement which will be used as a lecture or class room, and has a seating capacity of 1,424 persons-The basement is now used for holding the services of the church and is furnished with the benches and pulpit furniture of the old church.

The main auditorium, or church proper, will be completed during the next six months and will have a seating capacity of about 1,678. It is to be supplied with a gallery and the choir will be over the main entrance to the church. The roof, is self supporting and the timbers about it are neatly arched. The church is to be supplied with new furniture and the pulpit will be fitted up with oiled walnut furniture. There are now 376, 000 bricks in the walls of the church and 16,000 more will be required to finish the feet high. The steeple will be appropriately finished and will be supplied with a beautiful finial. A large and elegant bell, weighing 1,200 pounds, and costing \$600, is soon to be erected in that portion of the steeple in which it is to be placed. The windows of the church are to be of colored or stained glass, and the large windows in the East and West ends of the building will be ecclesiastically arranged, the one in the East having a large star in scroll work and colored glass at its top. The acoustic properties of the auditorium are very fine, and much attention has been paid by the architect, Daniel A. Sadgwar, to the proper ventilation of the building. Large heaters will be used in the basement and by means of flues and registers the build-

#### D. ath of Mr. Sanders.

Mr. David S. Sanders, an aged and prominent citizen of this county, died last night at his residence, about ten miles above the city, near Castle Hayne. Mr. Sanders was, we think, about 76 St. Stephen's A. M. E. Church, on the years of age. About a year ago e was afflicted with paralysis and although he has been an invalid ever since, the stroke is not thought to have been the immediate cause of his death. Old age and debility was most probably the cause. About teu years ago Mr. Sanders was one of the two Democratic members on the Board of County Commissioners. He was a native of Onslow county and was half-brother to William Mumford, the Coafederate citizen of New Orleans who was hung by order of Beast Butler soon after the occupation of that city by the Federals.

I take it that no such motive was ever conceived of, but that the real object was to place the bell in a central, as well as an elevated position in order that it could be better heard when rung-a thing impossible to many in its present position. Besides, does it not strike "X" that it would cost more to erect a belfry on the City Hall than to let it remain on the new Market? Hence his argument as to the saving of "a few hundred dollars" necessarily falls to the

ground. As for the "architectural vandalism" of the proposed structure that is the purest absurdity. If he will ex amine books on either modern or ancient arch itecture he will find many instances of this so-called "vandalism."
