**Abandoned at Sea.**  
A full rigged ship was reported on Friday last as water logged and abandoned three miles East of the Lighthouse of the Cape Fear coast. On Saturday she was found ashore on Frying Pan Shoals, six miles this side of the Light Ship. Wreckers went off to her when it was ascertained that she was named Louisiana and that she was loaded with timber. Her cabin was stove in and part of her stern was gone. The steam tugs Douglass and Alpha pulled on her and she was gotten off and brought over the bar into the river this morning. ### Life on the Rail in a Palace Car.

The Pullman palace car "City of Worcester" used by the Anthony, Ellis and Hathaway Company, arrived in this city on Saturday afternoon in charge of J. B. Phillips, steward, and Benj. H. Clough, porter of the company. The car was brought here in advance of the company to have some slight repairs made and to change the gauge of the trucks as the company is on its way South. The car is the same which was on exhibition at the Centennial, and was used by Sarah Bernhardt on her trip through the South last spring.

It is fitted up in elegant style and is supplied with all the modern conveniences and improvements. The rear platform is supplied with a handsome railing and is enclosed with curtains. On the platform is a water tank, coal bin and refrigerator. In the rear end of the coach is the culinary department, the appointments of which can hardly be surpassed. It is supplied with a very large and handsome range and next adjoining is the pantry where a portion of the provisions are kept. The crockery closets are very nice and convenient and next adjoining is the silver or plate closets. The saloon of the car is fitted up in elegant style. The floor is covered with Brussels carpet, there are elegant French plate glass mirrors in the ends of the saloons, a grand upright piano, and easy chairs, tables, etc., and in the windows are suspended beautiful cages in which are confined canary birds. The sides of the saloon are decorated with the photographs of the members of the troupe, twenty in number. In one end of the saloon is a beautiful piece of furniture, which is always taken to be a cabinet writing desk but which in fact is a folding bed with mattress and springs. The car is heated with a Baker Heater which is in one end of the coach, by means of pipes running along the side of the car near the floor. Besides the kitchen, pantry, crockery and plate closets and heaters, is a reading room, baggage room, separate wash room for the ladies and gentlemen, and umbrella and hat racks. In the saloon are three electric bell buttons which, when pressed, call up the steward, porter and waiter, and the car is lighted up by two very pretty nickel plated lamp chandeliers. Under the coach are six lockers, which are used to carry provisions, supplies, etc., for the troupe. The car has been fitted up with an eye single to comfort, utility and economy of space. All the furniture of the saloon can easily be folded up; and, in addition to the numerous articles and apartments we have mentioned above, fifteen comfortable beds are unfolded and spread out at night. The car is only 50 feet 10 inches in length, about the usual length of a Pullman coach, and the troupe live comfortably in it while on the road. It is a model of neatness and presents the appearance of a nicely appointed home. The troupe will arrive in this city on Wednesday morning and give their first performance here in the evening, commencing at 8 o'clock. The diagram for the sale of reserved seats for the performance was put on sale at Dyer's this morning.

### The Governor's Proclamation.

By reference to our advertising columns, it will be seen that His Excellency, Governor Jarvis, has issued a proclamation inviting the people throughout the State to meet in their respective churches between the hours of 10 o'clock a. m. and noon to-morrow, Tuesday, the 6th inst., to offer prayers for the recovery of the President. The proclamation was sent from Raleigh yesterday by telegraph to the Mayor of this city, with a request to notify the different churches, but was not received at the Wilmington office until 9:45 p. m., which was too late for notice to be given from the churches in which services were held last night. His Honor, the Mayor, however, promptly notified the pastors of the several congregations in the city this morning.

### New Locomotives.

Two magnificent engines were received here last week for the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta R. R., and one more is expected in a day or two. They are from the Rogers Locomotive Works, at Paterson, N. ### A Strike for Higher Wages.

The laborers on the lighters and on the city water works struck to-day for an advance in wages. The former demanded 25 cents per day advance, which was conceded them. The latter demanded 65 cents advance, which was refused. Dr. Cloud, we understand, has sent North for white laborers to take the place of those who have struck and he is confident that he will get them. The strike did not extend to the mill hands, as was reported this forenoon.

### Services To-Morrow.

In accordance with the Governor's suggestion services will be held to-morrow in the First Baptist, Front Street M. E., Fifth M. E., St. James' and the Second Presbyterian Churches. In all of those named, with but two exceptions, the hour fixed is 11 o'clock. The exceptions are the Second Presbyterian and the Fifth Street M. E. Churches, the designated hour in these churches being 10 o'clock. These are all that have notified us previous to our close but as personal notification was made by Capt. Cowan to all, white and colored, we presume that every Church in the city, whose pastor is here, will be open to-morrow for the purpose indicated.

Capt. D. R. Murchison has returned to the city from a visit to the mountains. The Asheville Citizen speaks of his visit to a place owned by him on the Yancey side of Black Mountain which Capt. Murchison keeps up, we believe, for the sake of the fine hunting and fishing. He was accompanied by Major Stedman who has not yet returned to the city.
