THE I QUINOCTIAL.

The City Flooded-Houses Blown Over and Unroufed-Giant Trees forn Up by the Roots - A Barque Adrift - The Old Weldon Warehouse Blown Over -A New Inlet at Masenboro-Max imum Wind Righty Miles an Hour

Our city has been in a ferment to-day. One of the most severe storms we have ever known in this locality visited u this foremoon. It came upon lus almost unaware, although as we intimated yesterday there were signs and portents of a disaster in the clouds which overhung the city all day yesterday. We are not able to give full particulars to day for the reason that we work under great disadvantages. A portion of the Review office was unroofed and the editorial and the wonderful efficacy of Dr. Bull's job rooms are flooded. Still we will de our best so far as can be ascertained in the limited time at our disposal.

The wind came first from the Eastalmost due East-and the storm broke u))n us about half-past 9 e'clock this forenoon. It was preceded by two hours of rain. The first blow was Mearful e lough, unroofing the new and rear porties of the Purcell House and blowing fences and limbs of trees, sign boards, &c., helter-skelter. This was succeded by rain, when the elements seemed gathering strength for the final charge upon

Just about 1 o'clock the second gale broke upon us in all of its fury. The wind had shifted to the West and the most disastrous part of the sterm came from that direction. It was perfectly fearful in its violence and inflicted much damage to property in various sections of the city.

The most serious disaster, one which involves injury to individuals, occurred at the Wil nington, Columbia & Augusta freight depot. The roof was blown in and four colored men, who were at work there at the time, were injured, three of them, it is thought, seriously. We have not peen able, as yet, to get but two of the names. These are Guilford Hodley and Jim Davis. Other sheds at 'the depot were unroofed. There is also a report to the effect that a house near the Eastern extremity of Castle street was blown over and a colored woman, the occupant, was killed, while two of her children were hurt, but this needs confirma-

A small dwelling, near the corner of Eighth and Church streets, was blown down but no one was injured.

A new house being erected by Mr. Geo. Honnet, corner Frent and Nun, was blown down and one cow was killed and two hurt, the property of Mr. John Haar. The front windows of the City Hall were broken and damaged.

The roof of Messrs. Aaron & Rheinstein's store, on Front street, was carried away and the upper floor flooded,

causing heavy damage to the stock. Not only was a part of the roof of the Purcell House taken off but the upper plazza in the rear, facing to the North, was taken up and carried over the building and thrown partly upon the L of Messrs. Brown & Roddick's new store and partly in the rear of Mr. J. Samson's The damage in each instance is consider-

Part of the roof of Messrs. Mitchell & Son's store, on Water street, was carried

A large shed on the West side of river was prostrated.

The large warehouse of the New York & Wilmington Steamship Line was among the first to yield to the fury of the blast. It is almost an entire wreck.

The barque Carl Max, moored at Messrs. DeRoset & Co's. wharf, on the west side of the river, was blown to this side, carrying with her a part of the wharf to which she was moored. The ship is uninjured, and is now safely moor ed at the wharf near Dock street.

The river front of Messrs. P.Cumming & Co's. mill, foot of Dock street, was badly damaged.

The roof of the warehouse on Messra. Worth & Worth's premises was taken off and a lot of hay stored there was damaged. Other roofs in the same locality were also carried off, but we did not hear of any special damages thereby.

Part of the roof of the Person building, foot of Chestnut street, was lifted flooding the offices with water. The telephone wires and telegraph

wires in various parts of the city were ton. prostrated.

Wooden fences and even brick walls, sept 9-1t

in various direction, yielded to the fury of the wind. Time and space fail and we cannot particularize these.

The maximum velocity of the wind was 80 miles an hour and it blew at that rate between 1:35 and 1:40 o'clock. The minimum velocity of the storm was 25 miles. The rainfall was about 1.90.

At Masonbore Sound we understand that a breach was made by the sea in the benks and that a new inlet has been formed below Big Bay, about two miles South of the old inlet. The break is a wide one and the surf was reported breaking over into the Sound.

The signal service wires are prostrated and we can hear nothing thereby from Smithville or the Sounds but fears are entertained for the safety of the steam tug Blanche which is said to be at sea.

Spirits at 50 Cents.

We stated a few days since that spirits turpentine had not reached 50 cents in this market for many years past and we were correct, notwithstanding the fact that the Star asserts this morning that 500 casks were sold here in March, 1880. at 50 cents. The sale was made, it is true, Messrs. Worth & Worth, (if our memery is correct) being the sellers and-Messrs. Chess, Carley & Co. the buyers. But the sale was made on private terms and was not given out for record. It does not appear either in the newspapers or on the books of the Produce Exchange and therefore had neither an official nor a public existence. As such it cannot be classed as a transaction in spirits at that time, inasmuch as it did not take place in open market. At least, that is the view we take of it and we therefore stated that spirits had not reached 50 cents a gallon since April, 1875, and we repeat the assertion, up to yesterday.
