Statesville American: John B. Black, well, one of the wealthiest farmers of Caswell, died Tuesday evening, of last week. He was about 70 years old, and leaves a wife and six children. The corn crop in Iredell will be short on upland, quite a failure in spots, but the bottoms, which are extensive, on the various streams, will be equal, so we learn, with any former year. The wheat crop was a fair one, and grain heavy. Winter oats fair; Spring oats a failure. New corn will be in a condition for use by October 1st. Already horses may be fed on it. The cotton crop will be larger than ever before, because much more was planted, but less than a full yield by a fourth or a third.

Charlotte Observer: The receipts of new cotton were 30 bales yesterday—54 the day before. At a meeting of the farmers of Davidson township, in Iredell county, a petition was drawn and extensively signed asking for a discount on notes given for fertilizers, and a reduction on the commission of agents. Citizens of Steel Creek report that last Saturday some negroes stole a molasses mill and a horse power, brought them to town and sold them for iron. The iron machinery aggregated 2,000 pounds. The remnants of the machinery were found broken up for use in making castings in a machine-shop in the city. Unsuccessful efforts were made to catch the thieves. Hinton Rowan Helper, whose anti-bellum fame as the author of "The Impending Crisis of the South," has been maintained by more recent works and finally crowned by the projection of the "The Three America's Railway" from the Arctic Pole to Patagonia, passed through the city yesterday to his home in St. Louis. He has been on a visit to his mother at Davidson College.

Atlanta Constitution: Cotton Factories and Philanthropy. Mr. Charles Estes, of Augusta, who is now traveling the continent over as an apostle of manufacturing, says, "Every thousand dollars put into cotton factories will comfortably support five people." The statistics show that \$1,000 given to philanthropic purposes will hardly support five people one year. It costs \$200 per head to support a pauper, or \$1,000 for five.

But \$1,000 put into a cotton factory will give to the five people it supports the sweetest bread of earth—that earned by honest labor. Put into almshouses. It gives its stipendiaries the bitter bread of charity. In the first case it builds up the country, supports schools and stores, and makes idle hands busy. In the last, it stagnates, paralyzes, impedes. Money put into an asylum does its work one year and is gone. Put into a cotton factory, it is an investment that supports its five people year after year, gives its owner a handsome dividend, and then comes back to him unimpaired.

The man who invests in cotton factories, then, is a true philanthropist in effect if not in purpose. The returns show that factories pay, in the South, 22 per cent. per annum dividend. Where will philanthropy pay better?
