A friend in the Caintuck section of Pender county writes to tell us of the disast. ons effects of the recent storm in that section. He says that it almost completely destroyed the entire crop of corn, peas, petatoes, cotton and rice. Forage is also almost a tetal loss. The oldest citizens say that they have never seen anything to equal this gale, the disastrous three days' storm of '37-forty years ago-alone excepted. It is said that the water is still from one and a half to two feet deep in the swamp lands.

. Loss of the Mary Bear.

The tern schooner Mary Bear, hail ing from this port and owned here, and plying between Wilmington and Baltimore, was driven ashore on Friday morn ing last, about 11 o'clock, on Stump Sound beach, about five miles South of New River Inlet. Capt. Chadwick and the crew escaped by swimming ashore but the cabin boy, Frank Fuller, belonging in this city, was drowned in the attempt. They succeeded in getting to the mainland and were taken in and cared for by Mr. Everett, whose place is near the scene of the disaster. On Saturday some attempts were made to save the cargo but with indifferent success. This information was brought here yesterday by Mr. E. S. Smith, of New River, who passed Mr. Everett's house on the way to this city, and it was afterwards confirmed by a letter from Capt. Chadwick to his son, Mr. David Chadwick.

The Mary Bear was owned in this city, and was the property of Messrs. Sol. Bear & Bros. She was originally the A. F. Randolph, and was built at Canning, N. B., in 1866, and about two years ago she went ashore on Frying Pan Shoals. She was gotten off and brought to this port and sold at auction, and purchased by her present owners, who placed her on the ways and had her entirely refitted, and called the Mary Bear. She registered 168 tons, a few tons more than her original tonnage. She left Baltimore on Friday, August 26th, with a carge of 266 bundles hoop iron, for Worth & Worth ; 177 packages carriage goods 191 bars iron, 16 bundles went ashore last Friday, was well-known iron and 75 kegs nails, for W. E. Spring Carley & Co.; 892 bushels corn for W; general delivery when stamp office is P. Oldham & Co.; 4,000 bushels corn for B. F. Mitchell & Son; and 3,111 bushels corn for C. B. Wright; all cf which is insured.

The Mary Bear was valued at \$6,000 and is insured, but to what amount we are unable to ascertain. Her freight money, amounting to \$650, was also The steamer Clinton, Capt. Von. insured. She will probably prove a total loss.
