The road is to be a narrow gauge and this gentleman was told by the surveyors that it would be built from Lenoir via Taylorsville and Statesville; that the building of the road was assured and that the people along the line would not be asked for subscriptions.

The Dixie Fair.

The Third Annual Fair of the Dixie Agricultural and Mechanical Association will be held at Wadesboro during the third week in this month, October 17th to 21st. A note from Capt. Patrick, the Secretary, says that arrangement have been made with the C. O. R. R. which will transport free all articles intended or exhibition. Our business men should make a note of these facts. Wadesboro is in the midst of a splendid agricultural country and the Dixie Fair heretofore have been well attended. It might pay our people to make exhibits at this fair.

A Child of the State.

The prospects at this writing are good for a large audience at the Opera House this evening, on the occasion of the first of the two performances to be given here by the Hoy and Hardie Combination. The troupe is a first-class one and come to us well recommended by the press of the cities where they have performed. A Child of the State will be presented this evening and it is said to be one of the most splendid successes of the season. The scenery, much of which is carried by the Company, and the dresses are very fine. The cast is the same as in the piece when recently presented in New York.

City Court.

Robert Palmer, colored, charged with disorderly conduct and being abusive to a police officer, was arraigned before the Mayor this morning. Officer Gafford, who made the arrest, testified that a crowd of colored men congregated on Front street just below Exchange Corner, on Saturday night, and commenced singing; that very soon the crowd became so large on the sidewalk that it was unpassable, whereupon he notified the singers that they must disperse, when the defendant came forward and said he knew what a policeman's duty was as well as the officer, and no G-d-d-white man should arrest him. The officer then immediately collared Palmer and while on the way to the Guard House with the prisoner and when in the vicinity of the old jail the defendant made a leap for freedom saying, "Catch me if you can." He ran about 100 yards when Officer Gafford, who pursued closely after him, caught the colored "gemman" who then wanted to make an apology, but the officer told him it was too late. The Mayor said \$5 fine or ten days in the City Prison. The \$5 was forthcoming and the defendant escaped his ten days in the C. P. This ended the docket and the Court adjourned.

Criminal Court.

The October term of this tribunal convened in the Court House, this morning, with Hon. O. P. Meares on the bench, Col. B. R. Moore, Attorney for the State, and Major John W. Dunham, Clerk. General S. H. Manning, high Sheriff of the county, was on duty for the first time after an absence of several months at the North recuperating his health. The following named persons were drawn to serve on the Grand Jury during the term, to wit:—Robert B. Wood, Sr., Foreman; L. J. Crowley, Thos. A. Brown, R. C. Orrell, Jas. M. Clark, Jas. Manner, Joshua H. Galley, C. C. Ketchum, Wm. A. Wright, Richard Beasley, Joseph M. Cronly, Wm. F. Burch, A. A. Dudley, S. H. VonKampen, Oscar Pearl, Thos. B. Lippitt, Charles Murphy and C. D. Morrill. The Jury, after being duly sworn and assigned to seats in the jury-box, were regularly charged by Judge Meares in His Honor's usual vigorous style. After the charge had been delivered, the Jury retired and the Court took a recess at 12 o'clock until half-past 2 o'clock.

The Court convened again at half-past 2 o'clock when the trial docket was proceeded with. The first case called was Fred Brown, Sarah Brown and Delia Ross, charged with abducting Mary Frances Jones. The case was continued, owing to the non-appearance of Fred Brown, who has fled the city. Several sci fa cases were then disposed of.

County Commissioners.

The Board met in regular monthly session at half-past 2 o'clock; present, Mr. H. A. Bagg, Chairman, and Commissioners Worth, Moore and Pierce. License to retail spirituous liquors were granted A. A. McLean & Co, J. D. Doscher and F. W. Ortmann.

The Treasurer submitted his monthly report. General fund balance on hand \$15,454.98; special fund—balance due Treasurer, \$265.58. Thirty-seven coupons of the denomination of \$3 each, and thirty coupons of the denomination of \$15 each, which had been redeemed, were burned in the presence of the Board. Report of school fund showed a balance on hand of \$9,399.15. Ordered that the poll tax charged against Edie Avery be remitted, as the party taxed is a female.

Application of Sheriff S. H. Manning for an increase of 5 cents in the price of board for prisoners in jail, on account of provisions, was granted.

Application of Thomas D. Murray, for remission of tax on the schooner T. D. Murray, as the said vessel was stranded and totally lost on the 2nd day of August, was not granted, there being no legal authority for the Board to grant the same.

Petition of Dr. T. Schonwald was ordered granted.

Exports Foreign.

Haytien barque Aurelia cleared today for Port au Prince, with 66,200 shingles and 204,101 feet lumber, shipped by Messrs. E. Kidder & Sons, and the British schooner Mabel Darling cleared for Nassau, with 60,000 shingles and 63,916 feet lumber, shipped by the same firm. On Saturday afternoon Norwegian barque Gambetta cleared for London, with 1,720 casks spirits, shipped by Messrs. Williams & Murchison.
