Female Strikers.

A meeting of the colored women of the city who usually go out as domestics was held on Monday night for the purpose of forming a Laborer's Union. We understand that the meeting was instigated by the colored men who were instrumental in the laborer's strike a few weeks ago. The women resolved to strike and have established a code of rates of wages which are far beyond the pockets of the majority of our people.

On the Line Again.

The little steamer *Elizabeth*, whose boiler was condemned a few weeks ago by the U. S. Government inspectors, has again resumed her regular trips, as we stated a few days since. Her old boiler has been replaced by a new and much larger one, and her hull has been lengthened. With her increased length and new boiler, her speed is said to be much greater than formerly. Her pilot-house has been raised, and the appointments of the little craft are generally improved.

The Deadly Mock Orange.

A resident in the Southeastern section of the city a few days ago cut down a number of mock orange trees in his yard which were thrown into the street and afterwards hauled to the suburbs. There a number of cattle got hold of them and two fine cows are known to have died from eating the leaves. We suggest to the city authorities that such poisonous matter should be destroyed by fire rather than thrown where cattle may be poisoned by it.

Death of Rev. Mr. Boshamer.

We regret to learn of the death, in Raleigh, early yesterday morning, of Rev. A. A. Boshamer, Pastor of Edenton Street M. E. Church, in that city, and a gentleman well known and greatly beloved here, where he served Fifth Street M. E. Church very acceptably from 1870 to 1872. The *Raleigh Visitor* says:

It is with pain we announce the death of this distinguished divine, which took place at his residence in this city, between the hours of 12 and 1 o'clock this morning. He had been ill for some time with an attack of typhoid fever from the effects of which, although he at times became better, his system gave way.

Mr. Boshamer was in the 35th year of his age and had been pastor of the Edenton Street Methodist church since the first of January last. During his ministry here, he has gained many warm and admiring friends, not only among his own immediate sect, but from those of all denominations and classes. He was a pure, unassuming christian, devoted to the interests of his charge. As a man of letters, he had but few equals of his age in North Carolina, while his powers of oratory were the universal themes of commendation. No man was more devoted to duty than this servant of God. The last public act of his life was to arise from his sick bed and aid in the ceremonies attendant upon laying the corner stone of the new edifice for his congregation.
Mr. Boshamer has been twice married, having espoused his last wife in the early part of the present year. He leaves a daughter by his first marriage. His father resided with him, and this sad affliction will be peculiarly afflicting to his aged heart.
