The Aeronaus.
There is no news yet from Professor
King, the aeronaut, and his companion,
Mr. Hahagen, and the conviction that
they are lost is gaining ground. The
ascension was made a week ago yester-
day and there were provisions for but
two days. A despatch from Genesee,
Ill., says: "About 3 o'clock this after-
noon Mr. Bailey, a mason, at work on a
house five mile north of Genesee, saw a
balloon, and called the attention of his
fellows to it. It was very high and
drifting in a southwesterly direction."
This is not credited at Chicago, however.
In the cases of the Donaldson and Wise
balloons, both of which were wrecked in
Lake Michigan, many persons in differ-
ent parts of the country were positive
that they saw the airships passing over
their habitations. All of these reports
were found to be baseless, as the above-
we fear, will also be. The conviction is
that King and his companion are lost,
but as to the locality where they met
their fate there is, of course, only mere
conjecture.
