"The Star of Bethlehem"

In reply to a correspondent who asked to be told what is the large brilliant star now visible near the Seven Stars and which some persons call the "Star of Bethlehem," the New York Sun says: "The brilliant twinkler near the Pleiades, or Seven Stars, is the planet Jupiter. The star that is sometimes called the Star of Bethlehem is not now visible, although, according to the calculations of some astronomers, another appearance of it is due, and it may blaze out at any moment. This star was last seen in 1572, in the time of Tycho Brahe. It shone out suddenly where no star was visible before, and was so bright that it could be seen at noonday. It gradually faded, assuming various hues as it did so, until it disappeared. This wonderful star is believed to have been seen in the year 1264 and 945. Its apparent period extended backward would indicate an appearance of this star about the time of the birth of Christ; hence its name, Star of Bethlehem. If you wish to know where to watch for it, look some forty degrees to the northeast of Jupiter, and you will see a group of stars arranged thus:

These are in the constellation Cassiopeia, and the dot marked "S" shows where the great star is expected to appear.

The Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley R. R.

The following, which we clip from the Statesville Landmark, will be read with interest here. It is a fact, as we understood some months ago, receiving the information in such a way that we could not use it, that a through Western line from the Ohio to Wilmington is to be built and that the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley R. R. is to be utilized as a part of the line. Our information was to the effect that men of means and enterprise were engaged in the undertaking and that some of the stock would be held here. The construction of this road would be the making of Wilmington. The following is the clipping from the Landmark:

Dr. L. Harrell, of this place, one of the directors of the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railroad, was called to Raleigh last week to attend a meeting of the board. It had been expected that a proposition for the purchase of the road would have been laid before the directors and discussed, and President Gray, who had been made acquainted in advance with the terms of the proposition, was rather surprised that no communication was received, but attributed it to a delay for which there was a sufficient reason. It is understood that parties in New York are prepared to offer \$55,000 for the State's stock in the road, assume its liabilities and bind themselves to build it according to the charter. They say it is their desire to open a line direct from Cincinnati to Wilmington, and that they can command all needed capital. President Gray has visited New York and investigated the business standing of the parties making the proposition and finds it first-class. The directors on the part of the private stockholders of course have no voice in the disposition of the State's interest in the road, but it is supposed that the parties negotiating desired to know if such an arrangement would be satisfactory to these.

It is stated that Gov. Jarvis is in favor of a sale upon the terms proposed, and Dr. Harrell himself is favorably inclined toward it, feeling that this offers the speediest and surest means of securing the building of a railroad up the valley of the Yadkin.
