



The Federal Court.
Judge Brooks has not yet arrived to hold the term of the U. S. District Court which is appointed for this week. As nothing to the contrary has been heard from him, it is expected that he will arrive to-night and that the Court will convene to-morrow. He did not hold the Court in Newbern last week, on accounts of being sick.

A Sensation on the Sound.
Residents of the Sounds near this city have become considerably exercised over a recent occurrence which may or may not be of a criminal nature. The infection has even spread to the city, and there has been much talk here about the matter within a few days past.

It seems that there is a young man who resides on a hammock (or hammock) of land on one of the Sounds and there is a young woman, of heretofore excellent character, who has been in the employ as a house-servant for three years past of a gentleman who resides on Wrightsville. These form the *dramatis personae*. The young man invited the young woman to come to the city with him and go to Coup's circus and she consented to do so. He called for her on the morning of the 13th of October, the day of Coup's appearance here, and told her that she must go with him in a boat, which he had then at the landing, to a point about a mile distant where he had a horse and buggy to bring her to the city. She went with him in the boat and they were not seen again until the next morning when a fisherman who resides near Capt. Moseley's place, on Top-sail Sound, found the young man on the beach and assisted him in getting his boat afloat. As he did so he caught a glimpse of a female figure in the bushes at some little distance whom he did not recognize. He did not get more than about one hundred yards to the young woman who was taken in the boat with the young man at some distance from the point where she was put into the water. It was evident that they had passed the night together on the beach and had had a good breakfast there afterwards. This was the last seen of either until on Friday, the 21st inst., when the young man returned the boat which he had borrowed a week before. He was asked about the young woman and returned a defiant answer. On being told that there was a warrant out against him he left hurriedly, and without taking his own boat, which was moored at the landing, where it still lies. After his departure blood, and smut and grease were found on the sail of the boat. The young woman has not been seen since, but the young man was seen last Saturday at a spring on Myrtle Grove. A warrant, it is said, will be issued to-morrow for his arrest.

There are several theories ventured relative to the matter. Some think that the young woman has been foully dealt with, others that she is living with the young man on his hammock of her own volition and others still that she has been ruined and has been detained there against her will and through the influence of threats. As we have said, the young woman has heretofore borne a good character. She seems to have left the house with the intention of going to the circus and returning that evening and that she did not contemplate an escape as witnessed by the fact that she left all her effects behind her and some \$13 in money due her by her employer.

The W. N. C. R. R.

In this connection we may mention an apparently well authenticated rumor, which reaches us through channels entirely unconnected with the Midland Road, that the Richmond and Danville people have determined to turn the Western North Carolina Railroad over to Mr. Best and his Boston Syndicate within the next ten days, if they will receive it, in view of Georgia, Tennessee, Kentucky and Virginia railroad combinations and complications, which have, it is reported, "called the turn" on the Richmond and Danville Syndicate.

We should not be at all surprised if the information the *News* has received is correct. The "combinations and complications" it speaks of are becoming well-known facts. The R. & D. people possess another key to the West, the old Blue Ridge road, which can be completed at less expense than will be necessary to build both roads in Western North Carolina.
